and profitable animals is rapidly de-  
veloping and that those who at pre-  
sent have any surplus stock can find a  
ready sale for them if a channel of  
communication between supply and  
demand is established. Accordingly  
as a means of starting a convenient  
Directory of Canadian Breeders of  
Angora Goats and Milch Goats, the  
Live Stock Commissioner will be  
pleased to receive from such breeders  
information regarding their respective  
flocks covering the following points:—  
1. Kind and number of goats kept.  
2. Usual number for sale each year.  
3. Approximately the prices asked.  
4. If possible a brief statement re-  
garding expenses found necessary  
and the returns which may be  
expected by one engaging in  
raising this class of stock.

Sanderson—Sims—That the meters  
shall be rented at the rate of 10 cents  
per month for 10 ampere meters and  
15 cents for 25 ampere meters, or if  
users of current prefer to purchase the  
meters outright the price is to be \$10  
and \$15 respectively.

Council adjourned.

The Council met on Wednesday,  
March 19, in the Clerk's office. Present  
the Reeve and Councillors Tyndall,  
Sanderson, and Palmer.

The Council submitted a draft con-  
tract for use in the working of the  
Electric Lighting System, which was  
approved and the Clerk was instructed

Mr. M. Ransom was appointed to at-  
tend to the street lighting switch at a  
salary of \$35 per annum.

By resolution certain necessary re-  
adjustments were made in reference to  
the assessment of the Village.

Councillor Sanderson was appointed  
Chairman of the Electric Light and  
Power Commission.

It was also decided to charge 4 cents  
per K. W. hour against the Village for  
street lighting.

Council adjourned.
