H. S. GRADING.
The grading of the teaching of the Staff in the Richmond Hill High School as given by Inspector Houston in his official report to the Board recently is as follows:—Latin I, English I, History I, Mathematics I, French I, Reading I-II, Drill and Calisthenics I-II. The latter would have been graded I had a suitable room been available for the work. Grading ranks from I highest to IV the lowest. Science and Commercial work were not graded in the report. As is usual Inspectors do not grade the teacher who is doing his first year's High School work. Both these departments were inspected and the work being done very favourably commented upon. The School remains in the "approved" list.

A GREAT SALE.
Probably the best sale of work horses ever held in Richmond Hill took place Tuesday at the Palmer House, the property of the Lauder, Spears & Howland Lumber Co. The sale was conducted by Mr. J. H. Prentice, and scarcely an animal out of nearly 30 sold was "knocked down" at less than \$200. Some teams went for nearly \$600, and many of the horses for \$250 and \$275.

TEMPERANCE DEPUTATION
Arrangements have been made for a temperance deputation to interview Hon. W. J. Hanna, Provincial Secretary, next Tuesday at 11 a.m. regarding the Local Option situation in Aurora. The temperance party feel that Local Option was carried by a three-fifths majority last January, but a few votes pronounced as illegal by Judge Morgan and Judge Lennox, and taken off the Local Option vote, reduced the majority a trifle under the necessary number. It is hoped that under the circumstances the Provincial Secretary will withhold licenses in Aurora until another vote is taken. Besides Aurora, deputations will be present from Newmarket, King, Whitchurch and Richmond Hill where the measure is in force, and these places are effected by the licensed houses in Aurora. Special cars will leave Newmarket at 8.45, Aurora 9.00 a.m., return fare 35 cents. Schomberg Junction and Richmond Hill, at 9 a.m. and 9.13 respectively, return fare 25 cents. POSITIONS IN BANKS.
No less than six of the larger boys from Richmond Hill High School have entered branches of chartered banks since last June. AURORA LOSES LOCAL OPTION.
Mr. Justice Lennox issued judgment Monday dismissing the application of the temperance forces of Aurora for an order prohibiting his Honor Judge Morgan from certifying that the local option by-law submitted to a vote of the people of that municipality in January last was not carried. The effect of this decision, together with Judge Morgan's finding that the requisite three-fifths vote was not secured, is that another vote cannot be taken for three years.
