A PROTEST TO HON. MR. HANNA

Five well filled street cars Tuesday morning took large deputations from Aurora, Newmarket, King, Whitchurch and Richmond-Hill to interview Hon. W. J. Hanna at the Parliament Buildings. The various speakers asked that no licenses be issued in Aurora diving the present weer. Mr. Aurora during the present year. Mr. T. H. Lennox, the local member, who introduced the deputation said that while he had not taken an active part either for or against local option he would impress the Provincial Secretary with the fact that something should be done for the moral welfare of Aurora, as conditions during the past two years have been almost intolerable. Rev. Mr. Despard, Mr. F. E. York

and Mr. Urquhart, made a strong case in opposition to the granting of li-censes. The vote polled for local option, as given by the town clerks, was 321, and 214 against, a majority a

little over three-fifths.

Mr. A. J. Hume for Richmond Hill, Mr. Perry for King and Mr. Gain for Whitchurch. It was clearly shown that the municipalities having local option on all sides of Aurora were not reaping full benefit, with licensed hotels in the centre.

Hon. Mr. Hanna assured the deputations that he would give the matter his serious consideration.
