NEW MARRIAGE ACT

The new Ontario Marriage Act came into force last Thursday and all June brides will be regulated thereby. An important provision is that to obtain a license in a locality where neither of the parties has resided for at least fifteen days a notice of application must be inserted in a local paper once a week for three weeks. The object of this regulation is to prevent sudden and secret marriages at border towns. Another provision provides a penalty of \$500 for a clergyman who is guilty of uniting parties mentally defective or under the influence of liquor.

KILL THE CATERPILLARS

Unless the owners of orchards get busy and destroy the myriads of caterpillar nests which the apple trees are infested with this spring there will be a great shortage of apples this fall in this section at least. Throughout the country the fruit trees are alive with the pests and soon whole orchards will be denuded of their leaves and any apples there may be will be wormy specimens. Orchards to bear well, should be cultivated and the trees pruned and sprayed three times each year.

RESTRICTED HOURS

The new regulations of the liquor License Act are now in force in municipalities under license. Instead of opening the bar at 6 o'clock in the morning the bars now open at 8. No liquor can be sold by hotels which is not consumed on the premises, and flasks cannot be sold. A departing guest cannot even take away a bottle in his suit case.
