HORSE CASE SETTLED.

A case which has created a good deal of interest among horsemen was settled in the County Court on Thursday, after the examination of a large number of witnesses. It seems that on the 5th of February Affred Gurdon, a dealer in horses, tought a mare from John Sheardown, giving a cheque, \$200, and took her away. The next day Mr. Gordon took the animal to the sales stable in Toronto, offered her for sale, but did not sell. The same evening she was returned to Mr. Sheardown's stable after dark. A neighbor hearing that the animal was returned informed Mr. Sheardown of the fact. Mr. Sheardown went to the stable, and thinking that she had been abused and over driven called in a veterinary the same night. Afterwards the animal was attended by both Dr. Kelly and Dr. Sanderson. As Mr. Gordon stopped payment of the cheque, Mr. Sheardown sued for the selling price, \$200, and for care and nursing. Mr. Gordon disputed the claim on the ground of "Fraud and Misrepresentation". The case was tried by His Honour Judge Denton and a jury. Judgment was given against Mr. Gorden \$275 and costs. Messrs, Lennox & Lennox acted for the Plain-tiff and Messrs. Robinette, Godfrey & Co. for the defendant.
