VAUGHAN COUNCIL.

Vaughan Municipal Council met at
the Township Hall, Vellore, on Tues-
day, July 8.

Members all present, Reeve J. A.
Cameron in the chair.
Minutes of last meeting were read
and adopted.

A large number of road and gravel
accounts were read, and on motion
were ordered to be paid.

Accounts for Thornhill village,
amounting to \$188.50, were also ordered
to be paid; also the following general

plans for concrete abutments for But-
ton bridge, lots 5 and 6, con. 8,
Carried.

Cameron—McNair—That Mr. Frank
Barber, C. E., be instructed to build
the cement bridge at Pine Grove ac-
cording to plans and specifications ap-
proved of by this Council. Carried.

A deputation of several ratepayers
from Kleinburg Village and vicinity
waited on the Council, complaining
of the impossible condition of the
Kleinburg hill, and asking Council to
have the same attended to at once.
The deputation was informed that the
Council had no control over the road
in question; that it would be
necessary to lay the complaint before
the Good Roads Commission in To-
ronto.

The Council adjourned to meet on
Tuesday, the 12th day of August, at 1
o'clock.

News Notes.

All hope of any resumption of work
on the Newmarket Canal, which some
of the townspeople and North Yorker's
have always cherished, are now dis-
pelled, a railway engineer having
been in town during a good part of
last week superintending the removal
of the plant, which has lain idle for
two years. The locomotive cars, steam
shovel etc., used on the canal will be
loaded on Metropolitan flat cars, run
down to Richmond Hill, and transfer-
red to Canadian Northern for ship-
ment to Chapleau, to be utilized in the
work of double tracking the C. P. R.

KING TOWNSHIP COUNCIL

The above Council met as a regular

Tenders for construction of a Cement
Bridge on the Townline between 4 and
5 Concessions, said tenders to close on
19th day of July at 12 o'clock noon.

Wells—Lemon—That Thos Cairns be
paid \$15.34 being 3/4 value of sheep
claim.

Watson—McCabe—That the bill of
Dr. Kay re attendance on Mrs. Mc-
Culloch for \$12.00 be paid providing
he accepts said sum in full of account.

Lemon—McCabe—That the Treasur-
er be hereby authorized to accept from
Archie McCallum \$3.60 for cement tile
purchased, and also 75c. from Arthur
Lloyd for one tile purchased.

McCabe—Watson—That Reeve Mac-
Murchy, Deputy Reeve Wells, and
Councillor Lemon and Watson be a
committee to examine and make a
thorough test of a Gravel Pit on the
farm of Daniel Casey, with a view of
obtaining the same for road purposes,
should gravel and terms be satisfactory.
The said committee to report to the
Council at July meeting as to quality
and quantity of gravel in said pit and
the terms of securing the same.

McCabe—Watson—That this Council
pay John Duggan the sum of \$15.00
as full compensation for having his
horse injured on a defective bridge on
8th Con.

Lemon—McCabe—That this Council
grant \$25.00 to grade and improve Hill
on the 12 Con. opposite lots thirty,
Edward Elmer, Commissioner.

strong's Hotel, King City, in lieu of
Isaac McBride's, King Station.
