ELECTRIC POWER.

A large amount of electric power is now being used in Richmond Hill. Mr. Stirling some time ago installed a 10 horse power motor in Trench's Garage Works, which is a great improvement on the former system. Mr. Lawrence now waters his flowers and plants in his greenhouse by an electric pumping outfit, 5 horse power, the motor being operated at a voltage of 550. Messrs. Endine & Son who purchased the 7 acres from Mr. T. Hopper has a similar pumping outfit for watering his perennials and small flowering shrubs. The outfit works automatically, starting and stopping at certain pressures. The water is pumped from a well into high pressure tanks. Mr. Stirling also has contracts for installing similar irrigating plants for the Dunlop and Mills greenhouses.

HIS HEAD INJURED

Mr. Barrat, a young man whose home is in King, returning to his work at Newton Brook Monday morning, was jerked from a light wagon, and was severely injured about the head. The tail-board being down he was sitting at the back with his feet out of the wagon when the driver struck the horse with a whip. Barrat was jerked out, striking his head on the stone road. He bled freely from the ear and was taken to Dr. Pentland's office where his wounds were dressed. In the evening he was conveyed to his boarding house at Newton Brook, and we believe was afterwards sent to the hospital.
