PICNIC SPEECHES.

The World in reporting the proeedings of the Conservative picnic neld at Queenston Heights, when Sir Ian Hamilton and Colonel the Hon. .Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia, were present, says that Mr. Claude Macdonell, M.P. for one of the Toronto ridings, in his address "used a gatling gun and took sight at the Canadian Senate, his arrows last year being aimed at the Germans." Mr. Macdonell further said in referring to the navy question, "we shall hear more of the Senate, that great bulwark of liberties of the Canadian people."

No doubt Mr. Macdonell's reference tto the semete was sarcasm. If he is im compast and can induce the Consservative party to join hands with the Liberals the Senate can be abolishwithout much difficulty. The Senate is an unpopular institution. It has few friends but it would be difficult for one political party to abolish it if the other party fought for ins continuance.

We believe that picnic speakers should employ their time better than telling their audience anything that might irritate Germany or any other foreign power. At the present time many nations are armed to the teeth ready to fly at each other's throats, and one never knows what a hasty word may lead to. The biggest and best men to-day are those who are engaged in furthering the arts of peace.

The British Navy will be increased by a new destroyer every two weeks for the next nine months; by a light cruiser every thirty days for the next year, and by a super-dreadnaught every forty five days for the next eighteen months. It is also worthy of note that every one of these ships will be fully manned and officered and ready to meet any possible foe the day they are put into commission. With such speedy preparation for every eventuality, it is not likely that the British people are lying awake o'nights worrying because they have not got Mr. Borden's three empty dreadnaughts.

The House of Commons in England, the representatives of the people, passed a bill on the 14th of July, to abolish plural voting at elections in the British Isles. The majority for the measure was 71. Ten days later the bill was rejected by the House of Lords by a majority of 124. Surely it must be humiliating to the voters to have their will frustrated year after year by a body of men who were born lords, and therefore rulers of the realm. Canada abolished plural voting years ago.

Sims—Tyndall— On motion the agreement with the C. N. O. Ry, residewalk was accepted, with the exception of clause 3.


