"Yes."

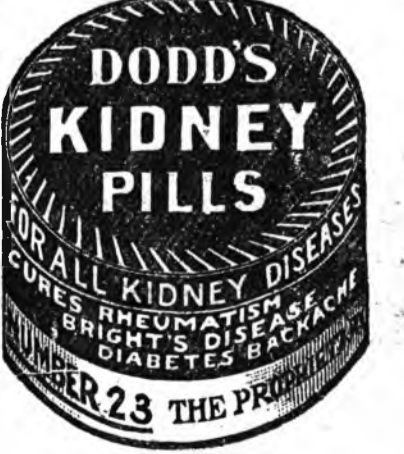
"Well, I've only got eleven children, and if eleven children aren't under twelve I'm beat."
