**EAST YORK LIBERALS.**

**Albert Chamberlain their Candidate**

The East York Liberals in conven-  
tion at Markham last Saturday exhib-  
ited their old time enthusiasm when  
they nominated as their candidate for  
the coming by-election, Mr. Albert  
Chamberlain of Toronto.

Messrs. W. D. Annis, A. R. Ross, J.  
Stuart, R. G. Kirby, A. J. H. Eckardt,  
A. D. Bruce and J. Gould were nomi-  
nated, but all retired in favor of Mr.  
Chamberlain.

The gentlemen nominated expressed  
the greatest confidence in Mr. Rowell as  
their leader, and were proud of the pre-  
sent policy of the Liberal party, one of  
whose planks was the abolition of the  
bar. Mr. Chamberlain received a most  
enthusiastic reception when he rose  
to address the meeting. He declared  
himself in favor of the policy of Mr.  
Rowell with regard to the "bar" ques-  
tion. "I would rather be defeated on  
that platform than win on the open  
saloon," he stated amid much applause.

Workmen's compensation, tax reform  
and the other questions before the  
public at the present time he was  
heartily in favor of and he discussed  
them at length. The speaker came in  
for hearty commendation at the close  
of the meeting for his spirited address.

Mr. Chamberlain, the Liberal nomi-  
nee, was for several years President  
of the British Welcome League, and is  
one of the strongest advocates of tem-  
perance in the Province. He is an  
advanced Liberal in politics, and a  
member of the Methodist Church. He  
was born in Glastonbury, Somerset-  
shire, England, and has been in Can-  
ada a great number of years.

Mr. Chamberlain takes a great deal  
of interest in the Canadian Brother-  
hood Movement and is on the Execu-  
tive Committee. He is Vice-President  
of the West End Temperance Society,  
Vice-President of the West End Tem-  
perance Association, Vice-President of  
the Horticultural Society, and an  
Independent Forester, Orangeman,  
Workman, and a Sons of England  
member. He is a manufacturer's agent.

On Tuesday Mr. Chamberlain's candi-  
dature was unanimously endorsed in  
the following resolution:—"That after  
having inquired concerning the atti-  
tude of both candidates in East York  
in relation to the question of temper-  
ance legislation, and having learned  
that George S. Henry opposes the pro-  
posal to abolish the bar-rooms, and  
favors the three-fifths local option  
requirement;

"And that Albert Chamberlain, who  
is a well-known temperance worker,  
cordially endorses the Alliance plat-  
form of bar-room abolition and the  
repeal of the unfair three-fifths require-  
ment;

"This meeting earnestly urges all  
friends of the temperance cause to  
give Mr. Chamberlain hearty and  
united support."

The resolution was sent to Mr.  
Chamberlain, together with an offer  
of help in this campaign, which the  
Liberal candidate gladly accepted.
