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STALLION INSPECTION UNDER THE ONTARIO STALLION ACT FOR THE SEASON OF 1914

After the inspection of Stallions had
been completed last fall it was found
that there were quite a number of
Stallion owners who, through not ap-
preciating the value of the Act, or
through lack of information did not
have their Stallions presented for in-
spection when the Inspectors were on
their routs in the fall. A supplement-
ary inspection was held in April to in-
spect Stallions owned by such men.
This made the inspection very thor-
ough but, besides causing additional
expense, it in some cases, caused con-
siderable delay in having the Enrol-
ment Certificates issued. To overcome
the necessity of a second inspection
for the season of 1914 it was decided at
a meeting of the Stallion Enrolment
Board held in the Secretary's Office,
Parliament Buildings, Toronto, on
Monday, Sept. 22nd, that there would
only be one inspection of Stallions
during the year ending July 31st, 1914,
which inspection will commence about
February 17th, 1914. The Inspectors
will visit each Stallion owner at his
stable, provided that he makes applica-
tion for inspection to the Secretary,
R. W. Wade, on or before February
1st, 1914.

UNFAIR TO THE VISITORS

The Newmarket Era of last week
was not too complimentary to the
Richmond Hill girls, in giving a report
of the basket ball match played on the
second day of the Newmarket Fair.
The Era says:—
"The Basket Ball Match between
Richmond Hill and Newmarket High
School girls was quite exciting, but
the Hill girls were too heavy for our
side and by rough play they won out
by a score of 9 to 1. About 200 people
from the Hill cheered the girls on to
victory. The match will be protested."
The above report of the match is
unfair. The winners won on their
merits. Nearly every point was scored
by one of the Richmond Hill girls
throwing the ball through the basket
when no other player was near her.
It is idle to talk of "rough play." The
referee, Miss Middleton of Toronto, is
an expert in the game, and would have
no reason to be unfair to either side.
It is true, "about 200 people from this
district cheered the girls on to victory."
The Era may look upon that as a
crime, but we believe the directors will
not object to the large number that
passed through the gates to the Fair.
We shall await the result of the
protest.

DIVISION COURT

Only three cases came up for hearing
before His Honor, Judge Morgan here
on Monday, several others having been
settled out of court. The following
were disposed of:—
Stephenson vs Avery—Plaintiff sued
for \$3.30, the price of a can of milk.
Defendant disputed as a milk can had
not been returned to him. Evidence
went to show that the empty can had
been put on Metropolitan car, address-
ed to Mr. Avery. Judgment for Plain-
tiff.
Farr vs Charity and Henry—Claim
\$31, bal. of purchase price of a horse.
Primary Debtor entered Dispute, but
did not defend. Judgment against
Primary Debtor and Garnishee for \$31.
Dean vs Watson—Damage to past-
ure, hunting cows &c. \$49.75, owing to
defective line fence. His Honor de-
cided that the Plaintiff should have
called the fence-viewers, to settle the
dispute as to the line fence, and gave
judgment for the defendant without
costs.
The next sitting of the court will be
on Monday, the 24th of November.
