The greatest marine disaster since the sinking of the Titanic took place on Thursday when 136 passengers on the Volturno were drowned in stormy seas while trying to escape from the burning ship. The rest, 521 passengers and crew were saved by ten steamships that answered the wireless. The Volturno which was owned by the Canadian Northern Railway Company Toronto, sailed from Rotterdam on October 2, for Halifax and New York. Up to the present time campaigns looking toward voting on January 5th have been haunched in forty-eight municipalities. Of these places one is a city, thirteen are towns, fourteen are incorporated villages and the remain-der are townships. 
