TEACHERS INSTITUTE

The Public Schools in North York inspectorate will be closed to-day and to-morrow to allow the teachers to attend the North York Teachers Institute in the County Council Chambers, 57 Adelaide St. E., Toronto. The address of the President, Mr. A. E. Lehman, will be given immediately after the opening exercises on the first day. The printed programmes show many interesting papers.

News Notes

A Canadian League, for the support of the loyalists of Ireland in fighting Home Rule, was organized at a mass meeting of Toronto Orangemen and Ulstermen in Victoria Hall a few nights ago.

The Orange Association of St. Thomas adopted a strong resolution condemning the action of the Minister of Education in his instructions to the Chief Inspector to allow French in the Public schools of Ontario to be taught beyond the first form.

The greatest marine disaster since the sinking of the Titanic took place on Thursday when 136 passengers on the Volturno were drowned in stormy seas while trying to escape from the burning ship. The rest, 521 passengers and crew were saved by ten steamships that answered the wireless. The Volturno which was owned by the Canadian Northern Railway Company Toronto, sailed from Rotterdam on October 2, for Halifax and New York.

Up to the present time campaigns looking toward voting on January 5th have been launched in forty-eight municipalities. Of these places one is a city, thirteen are towns, fourteen are incorporated villages and the remainder are townships. There are eleven of the forty-eight which have not before voted upon the question of Local Option; there are ten in which majorities were polled against Local Option in former contests; there are twenty-six in which Local Option by-laws were defeated by the three-fifths requirement; and there is one in which a Local Option by-law was carried and subsequently quashed upon a technicality.

Maple.

The monthly meeting of the Women's Institute was held on Wednesday last week at the home of Miss L. Snider. A paper on the subject "Should the Franchise be granted to Canadian Women" was read by Mrs. W. T. Cook, and a paper on "The Day's Work," by Mrs. W. Wood. The programme was interspersed with musical selections and refreshments were served.

The social held in Hope Church on Friday evening was quite successful. A large crowd was present, and upwards of \$50 was realized. Rev. S. W. Dean of the Fred Victor Mission gave a lecture on his work, illustrated by lantern slides. Dr. Routley and Rev. Mr. Cochrane contributed vocal and instrumental music. Mr. Elliot of Toronto also sang a couple of solos.

Anniversary services were held at Carrville on Sunday when sermons were preached by Rev. H. S. Lovering. Mr. Charles Norman returned Tuesday evening from Orchard Beach where he had spent a day or two fishing with Rev. Peter Addison, at the latter's summer home. Mr. Norman brought with him several branches of large, ripe, red raspberries from Mr. Addison's garden, something unusual at this season of year.

DID WELL AT THE FAIRS
