Interesting papers were given introducing the subjects on The Teaching of Geography, the value and use of the History and Geography Readers, and Supplementary Reading, Seat Work for primary classes, followed by general discussions. Miss Ewing of Toronto Normal School, gave two very able addresses on Household Science, showing the scope and place of Household Science with the other subjects of the school curriculum, and how the subject might be taught in the classroom.
