WANT INCREASE

York County Constables are asking that they be paid a straight salary for their services, instead of being paid by fees. They claim that the tariff of fees is too low. Following is the tariff complained of:—Arrests, \$1.50 for each person; attendance at court, \$1.50, restricted to one court a day only; serving subpoenas, 25 cents in each case, with an allowance of 13 cents per mile one way for territory covered; acting as constable in Sessions or Assizes, \$2.00 per day; attendance at Coroner's inquests, \$1.50; escorting prisoners to jail, exclusive of disbursements necessarily expended in his conveyance, 10 cents per mile; exhuming a body under a Coroner's warrant, \$4.00; reburial same, \$2.00; serving distress warrants and returning the same, \$1.50; advertising under distress warrant, \$1.00; travelling to make distress or to search for goods to make distress when no goods are found, 13 cents per mile; executing a search warrant, \$1.50.
