

DON'T TALK WAR.

Saturday evening's Telegram reports Col. the Hon. Sam Hughes, as saying in an address before the Empire Club that "Ninety-eight per cent of the people and the clergy are at the back of the movement for military training," and that "the drill halls of Toronto have done more for the city than any other institution with the possible exception of the Churches."

The wonder is that the Col. would admit the possibility of the church doing as much as the drill hall. No doubt the Minister of Militia thinks it good policy to endeavor to show that the church and the clergy are behind him in his war schemes. If war is a good thing for this country, the people should be talking about war, but if it is as clergymen generally tell us, a horrible and cruel thing, then it is dangerous to be continually bringing it to the attention of the rising generation.

Where there is war there is poverty. Is it any wonder that there is much poverty in European countries? Britain spends every year \$400,000,000 to keep herself on a safe war footing, and Germany spends almost as much. Does that mean that the King of England, and Germany's Kaiser are anxious to go to war. Not at all. The parties who are keeping up the agitation are the trusts and syndicates who are interested in selling their instruments of war.

And it cannot be denied that in our own Canada, politics enters largely into the subject of war and peace. Only a few days ago Prof. Horning of Victoria University went to Peterboro and delivered a lecture on the importance of international peace and good will between Britain and Germany. The very next day the Peterboro Review made this comment:—"Prof. Horning of Victoria College, Toronto, in his lecture last night defended the Germans and showed how they were misunderstood. It looks as if he was brought here by the Grit party to bolster up their pro-German and anti-British policy."

The trouble is that with some men and some newspapers a good word for another country is construed to mean disloyalty to your own land. But this should not be.

The Laurier plan for building a navy would give Canada a navy of her own, just as she has militia of her own, under the free control of her own Parliament, and ready to be placed by that Parliament at the disposal of the British government whenever Canada may consider such a step necessary. It is especially provided in the Militia Act that Canadians cannot be sent abroad to foreign wars. This was recognized as proper by the British government and the Conservative Canadian government which formed the Militia Act. It does not hinder Canadian soldiers from going to fight the Empire's battles with volunteer regiments. The law which is good for the Canadian land militia must be equally good for Canadian Naval Militia. It would preserve freedom of action. It would never interfere with Canada's loyalty and desire to share in the trials of the Empire.

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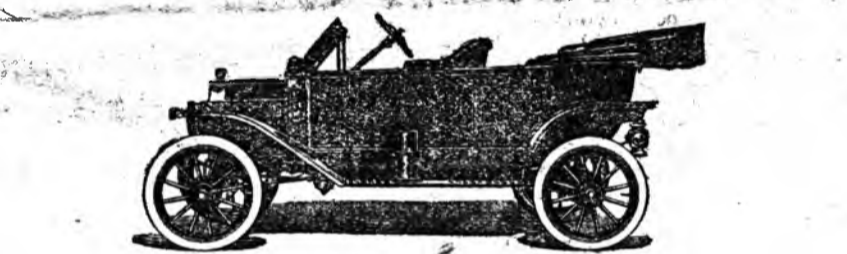
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
