## ANCIENT HISTORY

The Pioneer, that well-known paper, published in Toronto in the interest of Temperance and Moral Reform, should endeavor to give its readers more up-to-date news. In a recent issue it contained the following paragraph:—"Richmond Hill is prospering under Local Option. New streets are being laid out and the building business is brisk. Besides a greenhouse, 70x94 feet, nine new residences have been erected this year. Those not in sympathy with Local Option say there is considerable drinking from bottles, but drunken men are rare. The hotel accommodation might easily be improved, with advantage to both proprietor and the travelling public."

It is true Richmond Hill is prospering, the building business is still brisk, but instead of one greenhouse being erected we now have seven, with preparations for several more next summer. And instead of nine new residences, twenty-seven have been erected this year.

But the reference to our hotel accommodation is altogether misleading, and we have no doubt the editor of The Pioneer will correct the erroneous impression. The new proprietor, Mr. Stuffles, is giving good satisfaction. Travellers speak of the excellent meals and comfortable beds at Hotel Richmond, and there is not even the breath of suspicion that intoxicating liquors are sold.

The fact of the matter is a similar article appeared in The Pioneer nearly two years ago when the boom in Richmond Hill was just commencing, and it was repeated a couple of weeks ago. Richmond Hill would rather be pictured not as she was but as she is.

## FAR FETCHED

The Orange Sentinel of last week expressed a hope that the rumor that Hon. Dr. Montague would soon become Premier of Manitoba, would become true. Referring to school conditions in that province the Sentinel says: "At present the entire province is suffering from the operation of the Laurier-Greenway settlement," and thinks that Hon. Dr. Montague would improve matters.

Hon. Mr. Greenway when Premier of Manitoba, abolished separate schools. The Conservative Government of which Dr. Montague was a member promised to restore the separate schools, Sir Wilfred Laurier said "No, Manitoba must not be interfered with."

Mr. Greenway has been dead several years, Sir Wilfred Laurier has been out of power over two years, and yet those gentleman are blamed by The Sentinel for the unsatisfactory condition of the Manitoba schools.

The Catholic Register claims to favor a measure of Home Rule for Ireland, yet it seldom discusses the question from a serious standpoint. A writer on the front page of its last issue makes fun of the "Ulster forces" and the "Carson review" in Belfast, and says:—"The people of the South of Ireland do not seem to be very much worried over the threatened Orange rebellion in the north. In fact, they seem to be having more fun than a circus over it."

It ill becomes writers in Toronto to make light of the threatened rebellion. The Asquith Government is doing all in its power to prevent bloodshed, yet the prospects do not look too bright. Under the circumstances it is not wise to refer to the threatened rebellion as to a circus or football match.

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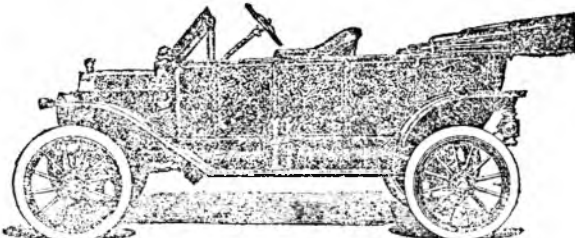
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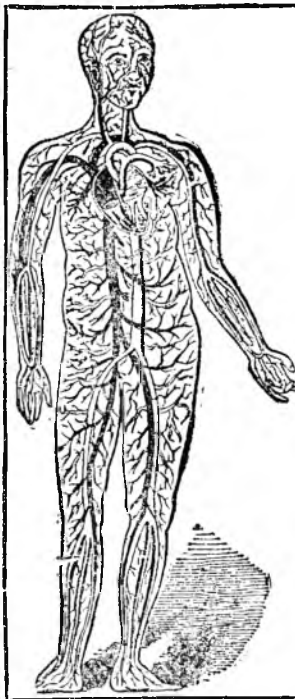
