RICHMOND HILL, ONT., FEB. 6, 1914

Two of the important developments of modern times—the Labor movement and the Woman movement—were dealt with by Mr. N. W. Rowell in a recent speech at Victoria College. Mr. Rowell paid a warm tribute to Allan Studholme, the only Labor representative in the House and declared that he himself looked forward to the day when there would be a score or more Labor members in the Legislature. In regard to the women Mr. Rowell thought that whatever our own views may be, the forces of this age were tending to the procuring for women their share in the management of the Country's affairs. He thought particularly that married women, otherwise qualified, should be given the Municipal franchise. "A married woman" he said, "instead of being handicapped by her marriage should rather be benefited by the State."

Quite unusual interest has apparently been aroused throughout the Province by the results of the voting on the Canada Temperance Act on Jan. 29. The chief cause for this keen interest is the unexpectedly large majority in the County of Huron in favor of the Act and against the liquor traffic. The majority was 2,568. The Act also was declared carried in both the other Counties where the question was up for decision—Peel and Wellesley. In the latter County however a recount of the votes gives a majority against the act.

Mr. George Wilkie, a well known Toronto lawyer, speaking at the Belleville Liberal Club under the auspices of the Speakers' Bureau of the Liberal Club Federation, declared that although not a temperance man he was absolutely in favor of the Abolish the Bar policy of the Liberal party and thought that the introduction of such a reform would most decidedly be in the public interest. He also made a plea for radicalism in politics.

By a majority of 45 the Dominion Government voted down an amendment in the House in favor of taking the duty off wheat to the United States. The Liberals voted solidly in favor of free wheat, the count being 57 yeas, 102 nays. Mr. W. F. Maclean, Member for South York was the only Conservative Member who voted against the Government.

February 18th has been fixed as the date for the opening of the Ontario Legislature. It is not thought likely that Sir James Whitney will be able to be in the House this Session and Hon. J. J. Foy, the senior member of the Council and acting Prime Minister will take his place as leader of the House.

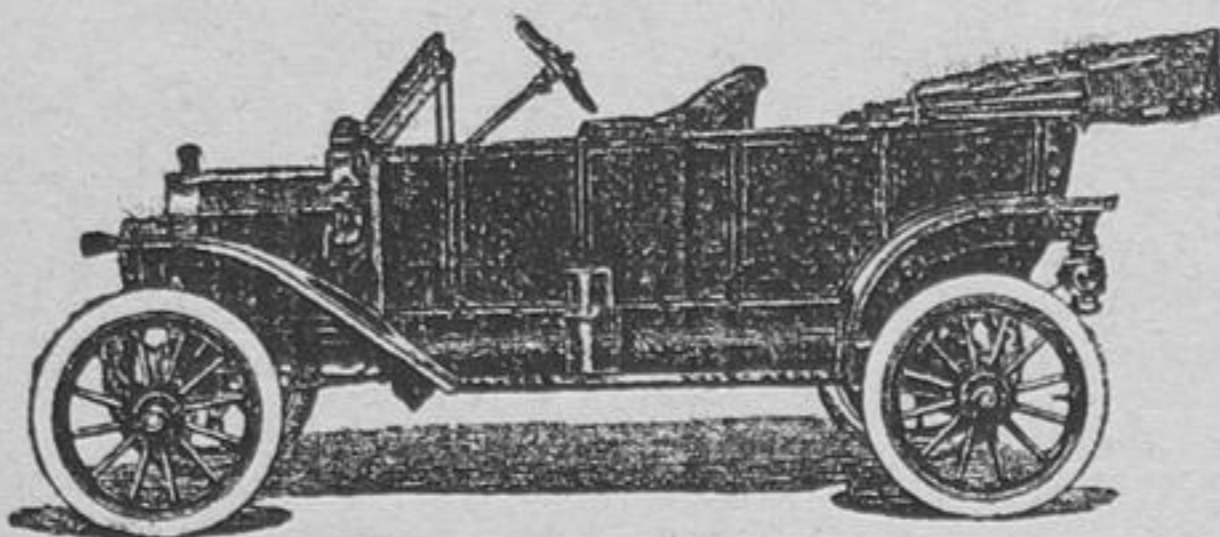

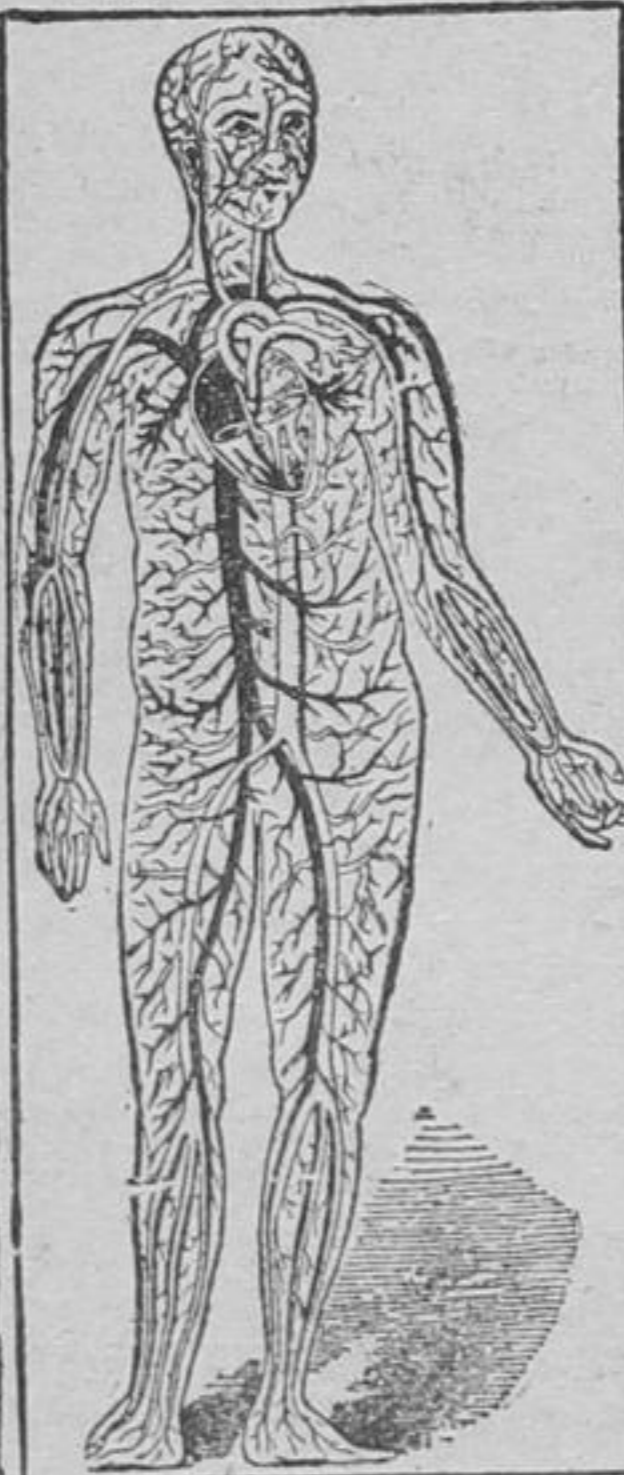
