

In the Local Legislature on Monday two measures introduced by Liberal members were voted down by the Government. A proposition was made to extend the franchise so as to give a vote to married women on the same basis as it is now enjoyed by widows and spinsters. Another bill introduced by the Liberal opposition proposing to close the bars on Saturday afternoons and legal holidays also met with a similar fate. Relative to an extension of the franchise for women Hon. Mr. Lucas, speaking for the Government, contended that the time was not opportune for the measure, and Hon. Mr. Hanna in refusing the second reading of the bill to close the bars expressed the opinion that public sentiment was not far enough advanced to pass such a measure.

The Toronto News objects to a criticism of Capt. Wallace for "offering men and money" to Sir Edward Carson to assist if necessary the Unionists of Ulster. The News contends that Capt. Wallace has as good right to send messages of sympathy to Ulster as advocates of Home Rule have. But readers of The News will clearly see a difference between sending SYMPATHY, and sending MEN to fire, if necessary, on the British Army.

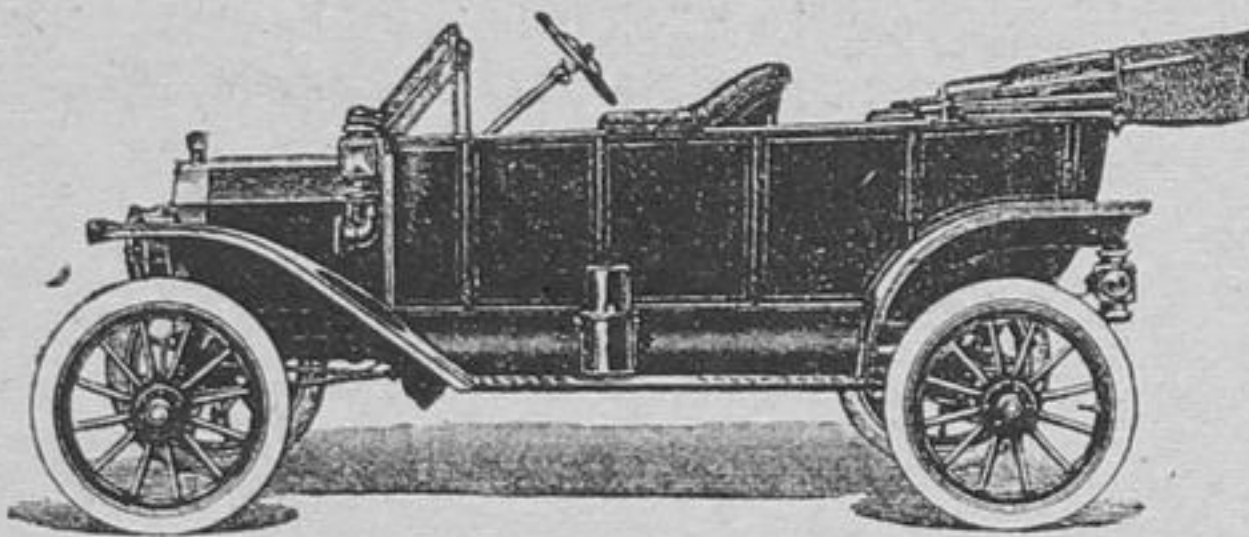
