ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting of the East York Liberal Association was held in Victoria Hall, Unionville, last Saturday.

The President, Jonathan Nigh was in the chair. The following were elected officers for the current year:—President, R. W. E. Burnaby; Vice-Presidents, A. D. Bruce and J. J. Ratcliffe; Secretary, W. J. Lawrence; Treasurer, R. G. Kirby.

A discussion arose as to the nomination of a candidate for the election on the 20th inst. Several gentlemen were asked to allow their names to be placed in nomination, but all retired in favor of Mr. A. D. Bruce of Gormley. Mr. Bruce expressed himself as being thoroughly in sympathy with Mr. Rowell's policy in his endeavors to abolish the bar, but as the bills calling the meeting did not say it was for the purpose of selecting a candidate, he declined to accept until assured that the nomination was endorsed at a thoroughly representative meeting of the riding. A resolution was passed along the lines suggested by Mr. Bruce, and it was decided to hold a nominating convention in Toronto on Saturday, June 6, at 2.30 p.m. The meeting will be held in St. Lawrence Hall, St. Lawrence market.
