

EDITORIAL

The Mail and Empire says that a vote for Rowell means a vote for whiskey flasks, and whiskey in the homes. The Globe says "If father buys wet goods, mother goes without dry goods."

The Mail and Empire of Tuesday says:—"Mr. Rowell would deprive the poor man of his beer, and force him to use 'hard stuff' or none at all." The poor man can well do without the Mail's sympathy.

"Jack Canuck," edited by R. Rogers, Toronto, is throwing all its influence against the Rowell policy of abolishing the bar. Last week's edition was a special election double number, and every page gave information relative to the elections, of which the following is a fair sample: "Rowell tries to get to Heaven by the route that leads to Hell."

Men with ballots in their hands can vote as they wish, but let temperance voters remember that a vote cast for a conservative candidate next Monday is of very necessity a vote for the barroom and the licensed club in all licensed districts. Conservative candidates who pledged their votes against the liquor traffic have been silenced or crowded out by the party machine.

When local option was being voted on in Richmond Hill it was claimed by opponents that there was little use in closing the bar here as long as they were left open in Aurora to the north, and Toronto to the south. There is now an opportunity to close them not only in those places but all over the Province of Ontario. Temperance men may not again have the opportunity during this generation.

The President and the Secretary of the Provincial W.C.T.U. have issued a circular letter to local presidents, reminding them that the leader of one of the political parties has come out boldly on their platform of Abolishing the Bar, refers to the responsibility upon temperance workers, and says that "in the opinion of this Sub-Executive Board every woman who wears the white ribbon, should cast behind her all party affiliations, and should aid by her voice, pen and influence, the man who is championing the reform that is the root cause of our existence."

Division Court

Nine or ten cases were heard by His Honour, Judge Denton, on Monday. The following are among the defended cases:—

Legge vs Hart.—Claim for rent \$100. Counterclaim \$100, damage to stack by reason of the plaintiff taking fence away. Defendant was ordered to pay rent in full, with costs, and was allowed \$35 on counterclaim.

Hook vs Chapman.—Plaintiff sued for the recovery of blacksmith's tools, \$60. Judgment for defendant, the goods to be returned to him.

Chapman vs Richards.—Claim \$20, lent to defendant. The latter said the sum borrowed was \$11.50, and that he had paid back \$10. Judgment \$1.50 and costs.

Pickett vs Ball.—Balance of wages, \$80. Defendant claimed that plaintiff left his employ before his term had expired. Judgment for plaintiff \$30 and costs.

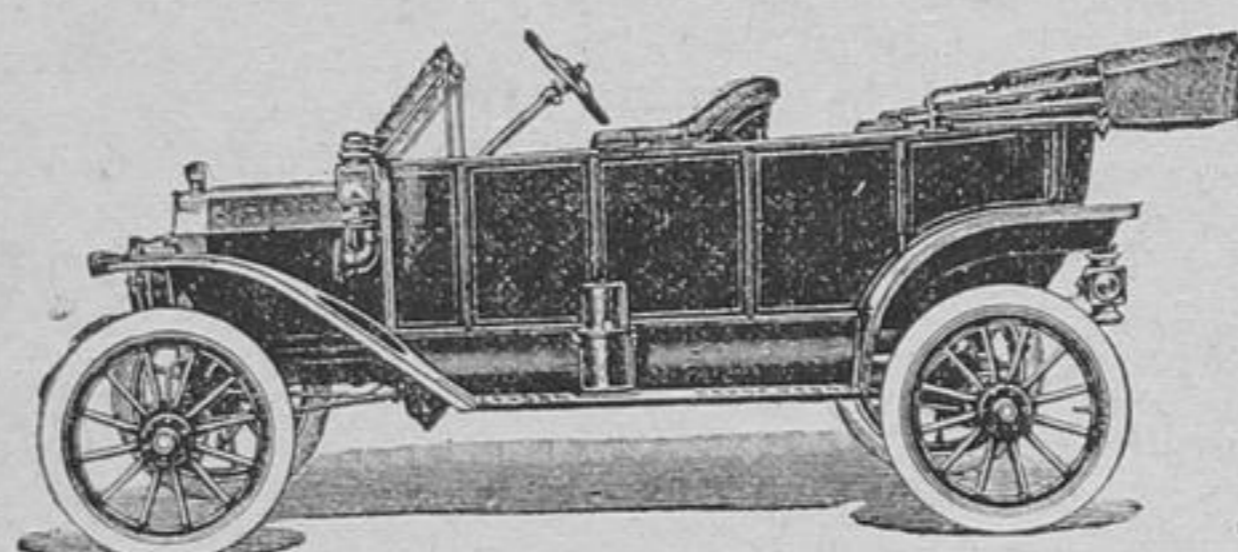

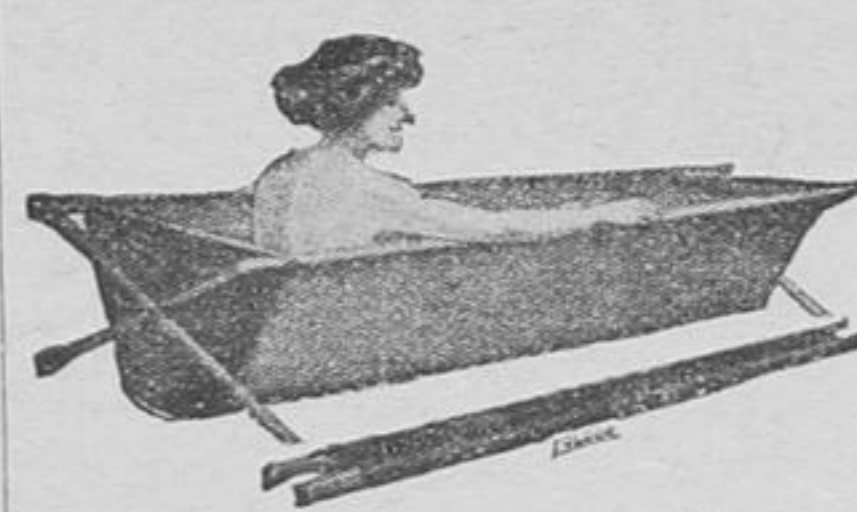
