Kaake-Robinson—that the treasurer be authorized to pay Canada Cement Co., for cement, \$225.00; and Rice Lewis & Son, for steel, \$148.64; for Kettleby bridge.

Campbell-Kaake—that a grant of \$15.00 be given to King Township Fair, cheque to be issued in favor of J. C. Steckley, Dis. Sup.

Robinson-Kaake—that J. A. Watson be authorized to dispose of the timber, lumber and tools in connection with the Kettleby bridge, also at the same time and place offer the timber on road allowance in the old Survey, opposite lots 3 and 4, Con. 4, by auction.

Campbell-Robinson—that a deputation of the whole Council meet the County Engineer in accordance with the Ditches and Watercourses Act, to look after the interests of the Township, to meet at Lot 65, Con. 1, on Tuesday, Sept. 1st.

Watson-Campbell—that the Clerk be authorized to communicate with the Chief Engineer of the Hydro-Electric Power Company, Mr. Gaby, stating that the petitioners of this Municipality would ask that an arrangement be made with the Municipalities of Vaughan and Bolton, to establish a power line that would be economical to all concerned, and ask if it would be satisfactory to call a meeting of a deputation of each to meet and arrange the same.

The following By-laws received their several readings and passed viz. To appoint Collectors of rates for the current year, with the names of Andrew McClure for the Southern Division and L. H. Hollingshead for the Northern Division, By-Law to authorize the Reeve and Treasurer to borrow certain sums for current sums for current expenses, By-Law to raise levy and collect for current year for County, Township, and General School purposes, and By-Law to levy rates for School purposes, as applied for by the Trustee Boards.
