The Annual Convention of York &
Peel County W.C.T.U. was held in the
Methodist church, Mimico, the 16th
and 17th of Sept. about forty delegates
being in attendance. Mrs. Ormsby the
Co. Pres. presided at all the sessions
and in her annual address showed that
much good work had been done during
the past year. The report of the Co.
Sec. showed an increase in membership
and the reports of the Supts. of De-
partments gave evidence of splendid
work done by the Unions throughout
the County. The Treasurer reported
a fine balance in the Treasury. The
addresses given by Mrs. Morgan Dean
and Mrs. Rutherford of Toronto con-
tained many good suggestions and
much encouragement. Mrs. S. R.
Wright of London, the speaker at the
evening meeting, arraigned the Liquor
traffic from the standpoint of the
Home, the child and the pursuit of
happiness, and showed very clearly
that prohibition does prohibit, taking
for her proof the province of Prince
Edward Island. Mr. Ruthven Mc-
Donald, rendered several vocal solos,
throughout the evening meeting,
which were much appreciated by all.

made a life member of the County, and

was made a life member of the Domi-

Resolution Committee, the delegates
joined hands and sang the Consecra-
tion hymn, thus closing one of the
most successful conventions ever held
in York & Peel.

INQUEST AT THORNHILL

The following residents of Thornhill
and vicinity acted as jurymen Satur-
day afternoon to inquire into the
cause of the death of the late George
Hooper, on the 13th of September,
namely, N. Smellie (foreman), E.
Duncan, W. Kaiser, T. Weatherall, J.
Keane, C. Torenson, E. Carter, W.
Chatterley, P. Robinson, Dr. R. W.
Hillary of Aurora was coroner.

Conductor Woodhead in giving
evidence said that as the car was
approaching Langstaff about midnight
on Thursday, Sept. 10, he called out
the "stop." Deceased moved towards
the door when he was warned by the
conductor to be careful. He did not
think the young man fell, but stepped
off the car while it was in motion.

Gordon Leathers who had spent the
day with deceased at the Exhibition,
saw him on the step of the car, but did
not see him slip or step off. He had
no reason to think that Hooper was
careless. Almer Metzalf who was on
the car when the unfortunate accident
took place, and who assisted in taking
the injured man to Dr. Langstaff's
office, also gave evidence.

Dr. Langstaff being called, said that
he was awakened about 1 a. m. Friday
morning by hearing some person
running up the pavement. He was in-
formed that an accident had occurred.
When he entered the car he recognized
George Hooper lying on the floor un-
conscious. He was removed to his
office on a stretcher, and treated.
About 1.30 a. m. he had a convulsion,
and several others followed during the
night, but at times he rested quietly.
On examination he found an abrasure
of the skin on the right side of the
face, and he had reason to think from
the symptoms that the brain was in-
jured. He had previously treated
Hooper for rheumatic fever which left
him with a weak heart.

The jury retired, and in a few
minutes brought in a verdict expressing
a belief that the deceased met with his
death by alighting from the car while
it was in motion, after being properly
warned.
