The following will be of interest to the local sportsmen, who wish to know the open season for the various game—Duck from September 15th to Dec. 15th, both days inclusive. Geese, Sept. 15th to April 15th, Grouse October 15th, to Nov. 15th, both days inclusive, Plover and Snipe, Sept. 16th, to Dec. 15th. Hare or Rabbit, Oct. 1st, to Dec. 15th. Black Squirrel, Nov. 15th, to Dec. 1st. Mink, Nov. 1st, to April 30th. Muskrat, Dec. 1st, to March 31st. No muskrat can be shot or trapped during the month of April.
