Council met at Armstrong's Hotel, King City, on Saturday, November 14th.

Members all present. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. Several Communications received and read. The following bills were presented and ordered paid:—

Joseph Billings, months pay \$37.50; Daniel Casey, road work \$1.58; James Mahr, cedar posts \$12.50; Frank Egan, re services as Auctioneer \$5.00; W. C. Appleton, teaming and repairs to fence, \$8.00; Wm. Williams, on account re cement tile \$100.00.

Watson-Kaake—That the Treasurer be instructed to receive from S. S. No. 21, \$6.00 for tile used for well.

Watson-Kaake—That the Treasurer be instructed to pay to the rate-payers in road Div. No. 4, Con. 4, the amount of statute labor charged to them in their Tax bills of 1914, each having performed the same upon presenting their Tax bill fully paid and receipted, satisfactory to the Treasurer.

Watson-Kaake—That Miss E. Tinline be paid the sum of \$25.00 for use of gravel pit for making Tile for the years 1913 and 1914.

Kaake-Robinson—That the Treasurer accept cash and notes from sale of material at Kettleby bridge, amounting to \$19.05 cash and Note \$8.25. Total 26.30.

Campbell-Robinson—That a grant of \$5.00 be given to the Canadian Free Library for the Blind, payable to E. W. Heimon Treas.

Watson-Campbell—That the Council pay to W. Bone \$130.00, being half of contract price for Cement Culvert on Towline Vaughan and King.

Robinson-Campbell—That J. Watson be paid the sum of \$91.00 as special commissioner by previous resolution passed by this Council re Kettleby Bridge.

Council adjourned to meet at Sutton's Hotel, Schomberg, on Saturday, December 5th.

St. Mary's Catholic Church

A very interesting and pleasing ceremony took place on Wednesday evening the 18th instant, when the mortgage was burned and electric light lately installed was turned on for the first time. The musical portion of the programme was excellently rendered by the regular choir under the leadership of Mr. J. A. Greene assisted by several vocalists from Toronto.

Rev. Dr. Morrissey of Toronto recited the Rosary, and after a short review of Catholicity in this vicinity since the days of the Huron missions, the pastor Rev. E. Kelly read the mortgage and consigned it to the flames. The new lights were then turned on, and everyone present was delighted with the grand effect. Mr. Porroil sang the Lord's prayer, which set to music is most inspiring, and the singer did ample justice to his grand theme.

During the Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament by Rev. Dr. Morrissey, Mr. Deausset of Toronto rendered the O Salutaris, and Messrs. Lafamme and Sault, also of Toronto, gave the Ave Maria. The Te Deum which closed the proceedings was taken in the solo parts by Mr. Greene, and the alternate verses by the choir. Much praise is due Mr. Greene for the indefatigable manner in which he worked for the ceremony as the musical portion of the programme was entirely arranged by him.

The electrical work of the lighting was done by Mr. L. H. Sanderson the local electrician, and is a credit to him and an inducement to all to have work done by local firms when at all possible.

Unionville

The consecration of the new organ presented by Mr. A. J. H. Eckardt, to the trustees of the Lutheran church at Unionville, took place on the 15th inst. Although the weather was anything but desirable, and the roads in a very bad state, the church was crowded to the doors with people from all parts of Markham Township. On account of the extreme want and suffering now being experienced by the Belgians, who have proved themselves worthy of our loyal support, this Council would urge the co-operation of all in making the fund such as would be a credit to the old historic Township of Markham. Also that a copy of this resolution be sent to the resident Ministers of the Township.
