When he died on Feb. 5, 1914, George Wallace owned property in Woodbridge valued at \$1800, and no will having been left, Nathaniel George Wallace, a son of the deceased, has applied for power to administer the property in the interest of himself and brother, Milton Ross Wallace of Calgary, Alberta.

The property left by Mrs. Ellen Wallace, who died on Nov. 19, amounted to \$21,465.10.

When administration is granted, the sons, Milton of Calgary; Nathaniel, Woodbridge, and the daughter, Ellen Williams Orr, will share equally.
