To any post office beyond 20 miles but within the Province of Ontario—1 lb. 10c; 2 lbs. 14c; 3 lbs. 18c; 4 lbs. 22c; 5 lbs. 26c; 6 lbs. 30c; 7 lbs. 34c; 8 lbs. 38c; 9 lbs. 42c; 10 lbs. 46c; 11 lbs. 50c.
