Newmarket
The Town council of Newmarket decided Monday night to submit a bylaw to the electors on February 22nd embodying the agreement with the York Radial Company for power supply which was defeated in 1913. The bylaw also authorizes the expenditure of \$15,000 on plant improvements. The agreement stipulates that the town shall take over all power contracts at present in force in the municipality and shall control the sale and distribution of power in Newmarket, the company to supply power at \$25.50 per h.p. at 1 1/2 cents per k.h. If carried the agreement will be in force for five years.

Maple
The deepest sorrow was felt here last week when the news came that Mrs. (Rev.) H. S. Lovering had passed away at the General Hospital, where she had gone for treatment. Rev. Mr. Lovering has the sympathy of all in his great loss. The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon from Berkley St. Methodist church to Mt. Pleasant cemetery. Quite a number from here were present. There were many beautiful floral offerings, including a wreath from the Maple circuit, one from the W.M.S. and one from the Epworth League and Sabbath School. Mrs. Lovering had made a great many friends here, and was greatly attached to the work in which she and her husband were engaged. She will be greatly missed in the church and Sunday school, and other societies in which she was an active worker.

North Toronto
The recent heavy snow-falls have been a great help to the civic officials, as a relief in solving the unemployed problem in this district. The last three days hundreds of men have been busy cleaning off the walks and crossings. For this labour they receive \$2.50 per day.

The services in the Methodist churches on Sunday were conducted by representatives of the Laymen's missionary movement. The Laymen have been holding services throughout the city the past two weeks.
Mr. Fred. J. Smith, physical director at the central Y.M.C.A., gave a splendid address, in the Davisville Methodist church on Monday evening, on Canadian soldiers at Valcartier camp. He gave some very interesting information about the life and training of our Canadian forces.

The Broadway Ave. Collegiate will hold their annual at home the second Friday in February.
The Collegiate junior team visited Oakwood H. S. on Friday last, defeating them by the score of 20. The boys have not lost a game this season.
A very exciting game took place at Aura Lee country rink on Saturday afternoon, when the Weston Ladies Hockey team played a friendly game with our girls, winning by one goal. After the game the ladies and supporters of both teams had tea in the club parlors and an enjoyable evening was spent.

The construction of the new wing of the collegiate is in full swing now, and in a few days the foundations will be complete. This new addition comprised four class rooms and a large assembly hall, with another new extension to be added this summer, it promises to be one of the finest schools in the province.
The Ratepayers' Association will meet as usual on Saturday night. A hot debate is expected to take place. The Yonge street double tracking scheme is again before the people, and as there are many supporters, pro and con, it is sure to be a lively meeting.
Mr. W. S. Dinnick, President of the Dovercourt Land Company, is building a fine residence for himself near York Mills, and hopes to have it complete for early spring.

For the District Cup yesterday Richmond Hill curlers defeated Brampton, but lost to Markham in the afternoon. The competition will be finished to-day.

Official Visit
Last evening R. W. Bro. Dr. Walters, D. D. G. M. for District 11, paid an official visit to Richmond Lodge, A. F. & A. M. Many visiting brethren were present from Toronto, Thornhill, Maple, Aurora and other places. During the evening a candidate was raised to the 3rd degree, after which Wor. Bro. G. Cowie and his officers were highly complimented on the work done. Supper was afterwards served in the lower hall, and this was followed by a good programme of toasts and responses.

After "Grand Lodge" was responded to by Dr. Walters, R. W. Bro. Nicholls proposed "Little Belgium" to which Bro. Rev. S. A. Lawrence responded in a very able speech. County Council

The new Warden has been nine years a member of Markham Township Council, and this is his eighth year in the County Council. He has been five years Reeve of Markham, two years Deputy Reeve, and two years in Council.
The proposer and seconder, respectively, of Mr. Nigh were William Keith of Newmarket and J. M. Gardhouse of Weston. In returning thanks, Mr. Nigh said he esteemed it a great honor to be elected, especially by acclamation.

The following committee of seven was appointed to strike the Standing Committees for the coming year: Messrs. Keith, Padget, Pingsley, Silverhorn, Wallace, Griffiths and Knowles.
Information was received of the appointment of Judge Coatsworth and T. H. Brunton, Police Magistrate, to serve with the Warden on the County Police Commission, and of the appointment of George Syme, jun., to be a Police Magistrate for the county at a salary of \$600.

Thornhill
The Thornhill Branch of the Women's Institute held their annual January meeting at the home of Mrs. A. Hall. Mrs. McTurk of Lucan, the speaker for the day, gave a most delightful and instructive address on "Keep on the Sunny Side." Mrs. Burton read an interesting paper on "Home keeping."
