The Late Mrs. Ellarby

On Saturday, January 23, 1915, there passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Cook, Church St., Richmond Hill, Mrs. Jos. Ellarby in her 87th year.

Mrs. Ellarby came to Canada from Roos, Yorkshire, England, with her parents, at the age of 20, and settled at Victoria Square, Markham. Later she married Mr. Ellarby with whom she had been acquainted in her homeland.

For sixty years her home was at the Square where her kindness and sweet disposition endeared her to a large circle of friends who bear loving tribute to the gentle unobtrusive helpfulness of their lamented friend. Throughout this province are ministers who bear testimony of the warm welcome to the "Circuit Rider." Owing to the failing health of Mr. Ellarby they moved from Victoria Square to the home of their daughter, Mrs. Wm. Cook, Carrville, where Mr. Ellarby predeceased his wife seven years last August. For some years Mrs. Ellarby had been a semi-invalid, but all this time her cheerful disposition kept her from murmuring, and those who saw her always found her with a cheerful smile of welcome.

During her life she was a consistent member and active worker in the Methodist Church, while health permitted. The end came calmly and peacefully, and like a tired child she slipped quietly away to the Eternal Rest.

The sympathy of the church and community is extended to Mrs. Cook in her bereavement.

Choral Society's Banquet

R. Herbison. The speakers were optimistic, especially the conductor who foreshadowed a successful future for the society. Several of the speakers referred to the excellent work given by Mr. Newton to his class without a cent of remuneration.

The musical part of the programme was contributed by the Misses Saigeon, the Misses Switzer, Mrs. Van Wart, Mrs. Godwin and Dr. Routley. The piano accompanists were Mrs. Routley, Miss L. Richardson and Mr. J. E. Newton.

Another happy feature of the evening was the presentation to the conductor of a sheaf of roses from the Choral Society, and a conductor's baton by the Maple contingent. The former presentation was made by Mrs. Godwin and the latter by Miss Saigeon. After an expression of thanks for the remembrance the party dispersed, singing "Rule Britannia" which Mr. Newton conducted with the new baton.
