### War Stamps

The Government has announced that the new stamp act will take effect on April 15th. On and after that date all letters will require, in addition to the present two cent stamp a special one cent "War Stamp." From the same date a two cent "War Stamp" will have to be affixed to all cheques, bills of exchange and promissory notes. The stamps are to be cancelled by the banks when presented. Promissory notes, not payable at or deposited in a bank for collection do not require to be stamped. The penalty for failure to affix a stamp is \$50, while failure to cancel it by the bank is \$100.

### South York Organized

A meeting to organize the new Dominion riding of South York was held Friday afternoon in the offices of the General Reform Association, Mr. A. D. Bruce of Gormley presiding. The meeting was largely attended and was representative of every section of the riding. A constitution was adopted after a discussion, and the following officers were elected: President, William Pratt, Richmond Hill, Vice-Presidents, Johnathan Nigh, Markham township; P. P. Crosby, Markham village; T. H. Trench, Richmond Hill; John Mackenzie, East York township; Thomas Fitzpatrick, West York township; A. W. Rennick, Ward One, Toronto; Charles Murphy, Ward Two, Toronto; W. J. Lawrence, Ward Three, Toronto; W. Reed, Ward Six, Toronto; Secretary-Treasurer, J. McDougall, 1,151 Dufferin street.

The meeting was unanimous to contest the riding. A mass meeting will be held in Toronto at an early date to nominate the party candidate, and in the meantime the Executive was instructed to interview several gentlemen and ascertain if they were willing to allow their names to go before the meeting.

### Victoria Square

The Victoria Square Red Cross workers of No. 4 Division, Markham Township, collected in February \$122.20 and purchased with it eight webs of grey and shaker flannel, and made it into garments and have shipped to Red Cross headquarters, King St., Toronto, twenty five night shirts, thirty day shirts, twenty-four surgical jackets, twenty-one pajama suits, thirteen grey bed jackets, seventy pair grey socks, and one pair pillows.

The funeral of the late W. G. Boynton took place on Tuesday, 23rd inst. There was a large procession of relatives and friends gathered to show respect and sympathy to the family. Rev. Mr. Aikenhead had charge of the service and spoke feelingly from the text "For Me to Die is Gain." The late Mr. Boynton about a year ago had a severe attack of internal hemorrhage. Recovering he seemed in better spirits and health than formerly, and engaged in work with energy. However another attack this spring proved fatal and he passed away on Sunday 21st, in his 54th year. Mr. Boynton spent his life in this vicinity and was an energetic and successful farmer. For thirty-four years he was a member of the Methodist Church. "Geordie" as he was called was of a genial disposition and was respected by all who knew him. In politics he was a staunch Conservative.
