### An Enthusiastic Red Cross Meeting

On Monday afternoon about thirty-five women and girls assembled in the Foresters Hall to consider plans for Red Cross work. Mrs. T. F. McMahon was elected chairman of the meeting, and explained that a good deal of Red Cross work had been done intermittently by various societies; and that the object of this meeting was to form a society to unite all the women and girls in regular and continuous work. It was decided to organize a Red Cross Auxiliary, the membership fee to be 25 cents. The work of the Society will be divided into three parts, under different committees, first knitting, second sewing, and third surgical supplies, which latter will be entirely in the hands of the girls.

Ways and means of securing funds for material, were discussed, and subscriptions for this purpose will be gratefully accepted.
