Thirteen exursionists from Woodgreen Methodist and St. John's Presbyterian churches, Toronto, were killed and about sixty others more or less seriously wounded last evening about 7.40 o'clock, when a car jumped the track coming around a curve between Brock's monument and the station at Queenston. The picnickers were thrown over a twenty foot embankment. Many of the dead and wounded were brought home later in the evening.


