### Body Found

After nearly three days of almost ceaseless efforts, Mait Aykroyd and his assistants, shortly before 4 o'clock Thursday afternoon, recovered the body of Harold Belbin, the young man from Eglinton, who on the previous Tuesday morning lost his life while bathing in the waters of Bond Lake. Much difficulty was experienced owing to the presence of large branches and trunks of trees, and the body was at last recovered in about 85 feet of water. The remains were taken to the home of his parents, 100 Sandan Ave, North Toronto.

### Unintentional Blow

The coroner's jury that heard the evidence following the unfortunate occurrence in Toronto brought in the following verdict: "We, the jury, find that Robert Montgomery died at St. Michael's Hospital on July 9, 1915, from hemorrhage on the brain, caused by the severing of an artery by a blow received from Frank Coombs, who being attacked by deceased and William Montgomery, according to the evidence, was defending himself when the blow was struck, and that there was no intent to do bodily injury to the boy."

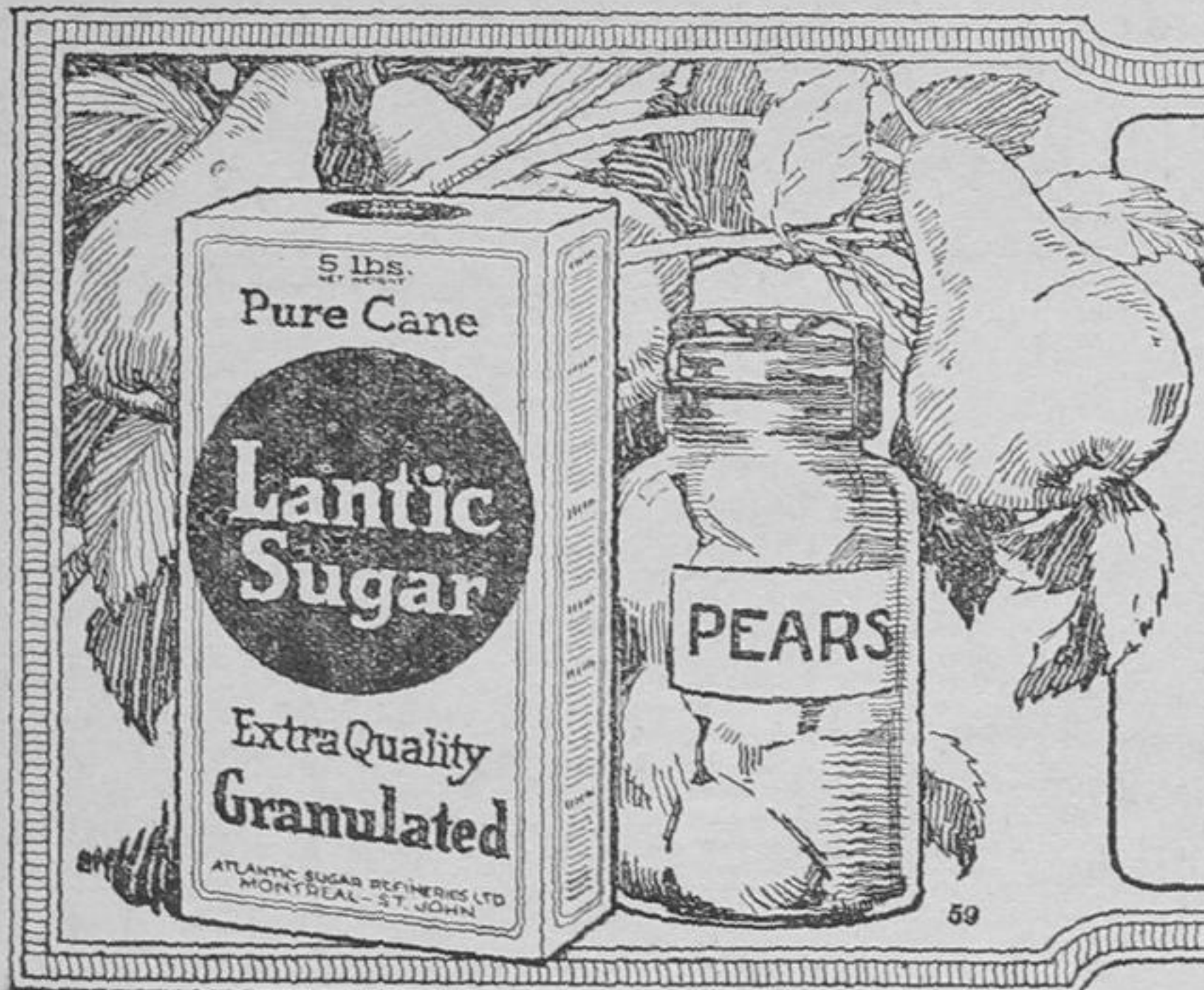
