There was never a time in the thirty-seven years of its history when the Canadian National Exhibition promised more real instruction and entertainment than this year. In addition to the marvelous proofs of the manner in which the patriot at home is taking care of his responsibilities in the way of increased production that the patriot at the front may have the wherewithal to keep his place in the battle line, there will be special features of patriotic and historic significance. The big war spectacle in front of the Grand Stand will be quite the most elaborate pageant ever presented by the Fair, while the Model Military Camp, aeroplane flights and the mining and torpedoing of ships in the harbour, supplemented by the war trophies, will be a revelation. The new Giant Midway, with its army of spicers, never presented a more diversified list of attractions, while the Hippodrome and Circus in front of the Grand Stand will be a feature in the amusement line.

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Barn Burned

During the progress of the heavy electrical wind and rainstorm which passed over York and Ontario counties on Sunday, a large barn on the farm belonging to Jonathan Calvert, and tenanted by William Penny, concession 4, Markham Township, near the Village of Buttonville, was struck by lightning and burned to the ground. All the other outbuildings adjoining the barn were destroyed, and the contents, consisting of a large quantity of hay, implements, poultry and hogs. By prompt action on the part of Mr. Penny and the neighbors, the horses in the stable were saved. The loss on the buildings is placed at between \$1500 and \$2000. The property is said to be fairly well insured.

Poultry Breeders' Opportunity

Canada in past years has imported more poultry and more eggs than she has exported. Yet her production has materially increased, but it has failed to keep pace with the consumption. In twenty years the egg production developed from 64,499,241 dozen to 123,071,034 dozen, but the consumption increased from 11.8 per capita to 17.39. That is to say the individual fondness for eggs had increased over fifty per cent. The population grew in those twenty years, or from 1891 to 1911, according to the census, from 4,833,239 to 7,204,838, an increase of 2,371,599, and the egg production mounted up 58,571,793 dozen. In spite of this fact, and although the exports fell about to zero, 2,378,630 dozen had to be imported. In the same time the number of poultry in Canada grew from 12,696,701 to 29,548,723. Here again, although the increase was close upon thirteen million, the imports exceeded the exports in value to the amount of \$111,696. Every Canadian producer should endeavour, therefore, to produce this year more and better eggs and poultry than ever before.
