

## EDITORIAL

Tuesday's World contains an editorial favoring a three cent postage stamp for ordinary domestic letters. The suggestion is a good one, and we see no good reason why the Dominion Government will not issue the stamp. Surely a 3 cent stamp should be the equivalent of a 2 and a 1. At present 2 cents are supposed to be dropped into the Government treasury every time a letter is posted, while the other cent goes under the name of a war tax. If the new stamp is coined, two-thirds may still go into the treasury and the other one-third be known as war tax. Certainly, if the World's suggestion is adopted many a letter will be forwarded direct to the owner, that now goes to the dead letter office, and returned to the sender for the stamp he had forgotten to lick.

A special meeting of the Red Cross Auxiliary will be held in Forester's Hall, to-morrow (Friday) afternoon at 3 o'clock. Every member is asked to be present as business of importance must be decided.

### Horticultural Society

The Society will hold its annual exhibition on Wednesday, Sept. 8th, in the Skating Rink. Only members can compete for prizes, but anyone can become a member by paying the annual fee of \$1.00.

The Hall will be open for business at 8 a.m. and all exhibits must be in place by 11 a.m., when the judges will begin their work.

If you have not got a prize list, go to the Secretary, Mr. G. F. Allen, who will gladly supply you. This list is very comprehensive and it is almost certain that you'll find that awards will be given for some plant, flower or vegetable that you now have in excellence, right in your own garden; and of course you are not allowed to take them from anywhere else.

The awards are on a very liberal scale, and you will be greatly interested in competing. The admission to see the show has been fixed at 10 cents only, but children under 15 years go free. All the fees to go to the aid of the Red Cross.

Now please get the date well fixed in your mind, 'Wednesday, Sept. 8th,' and do your share to shove Richmond Hill a little further along toward the goal we are aiming for, namely, to give our good town a name and reputation for everything that is neat, tidy, clean and beautiful.

Mrs. Wm. and Murray Vanderburgh when returning from church Sunday evening were struck by an auto and rather badly bruised and shaken up.

### Badly Hurt

An accident occurred Sunday evening after dark opposite Mr. J. N. Boyle's farm on Yonge street, which might have proven fatal. Mrs. Wm. Vanderburgh and son Murray were walking southward when they were both struck in the back by an automobile going the same way. As a Metropolitan car, with a bright headlight, was running in the opposite direction the pedestrians neither saw nor heard the auto behind them until they were struck. The driver picked them up, drove them to their home, and hurried back to Richmond Hill for a doctor. Mrs. Vanderburgh was put to bed, and though it is hoped her injuries are not serious she received many bruises, and both mother and son received a severe shock. Murray was able to move around a little a day or two after the accident, but Mrs. Vanderburgh was confined to her bed several days.

### Estray Stock

If an animal strays to one's premises it should be advertised at once in the local paper. The law is very strict on this point and holds rigidly to account any person neglecting to advertise strayed animals. If the owner does not claim the animal after it has been advertised the legal number of times, the Township or Town Clerk must then be notified. The animal is then sold by public auction under authority of the township or town clerk and the balance—after paying expense of advertising, etc.—is deposited in the bank to the credit of the municipality. If the owner turns up after all this has been done, the money in the bank is paid over to him and that closes the whole matter.

### News Notes

Four ex-ministers of the Manitoba Government, namely, ex-Premier Roblin, Dr. Montague, Minister of Public Works, and Messrs. Howdon and Caldwell were arrested in Winnipeg on Tuesday, charged with conspiracy to defraud the people. They were released on \$50,000 bail each.

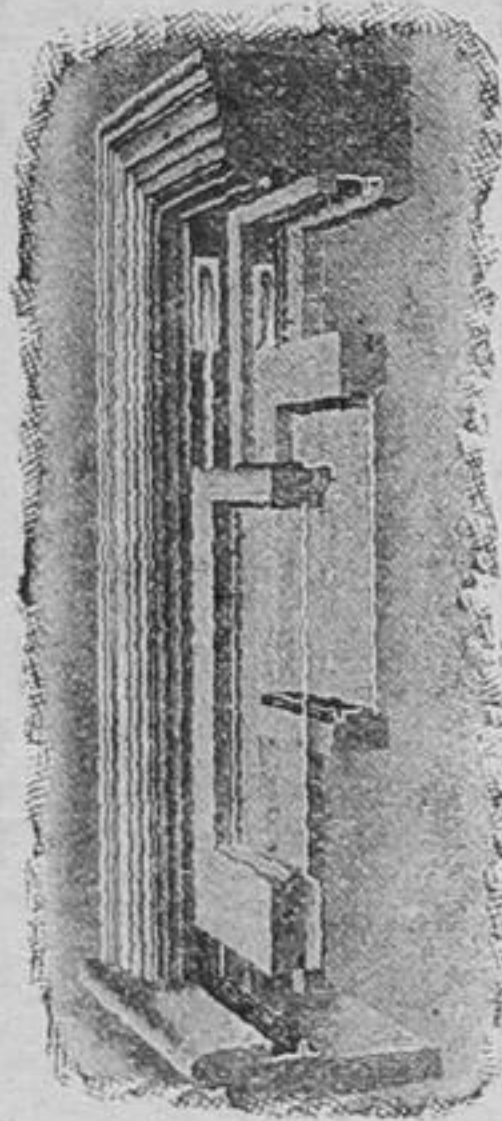

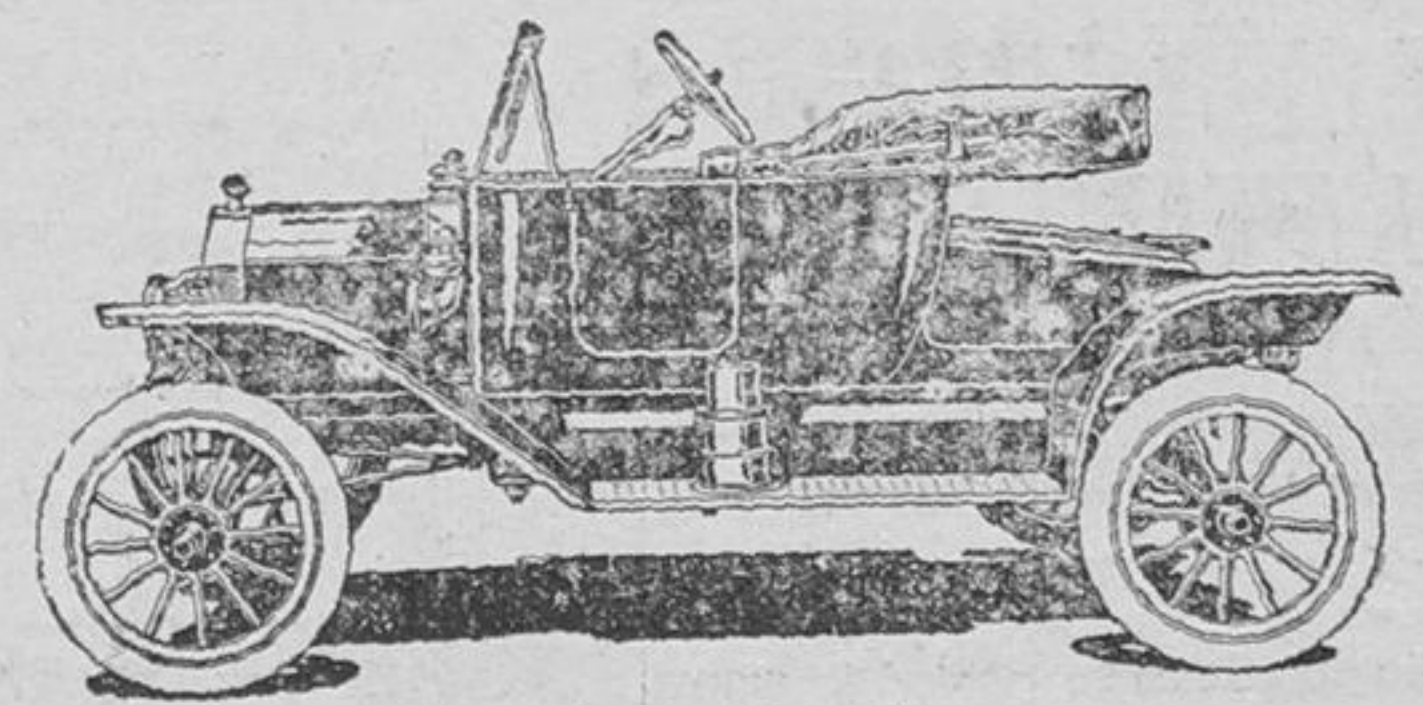

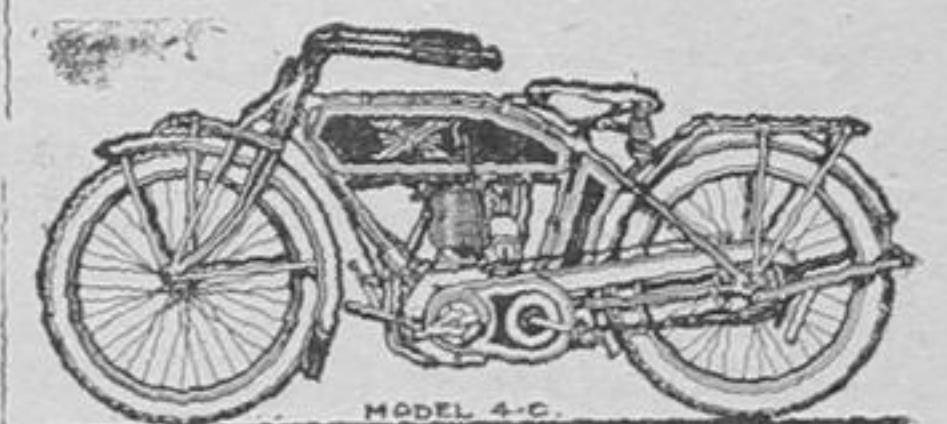
