York Pioneers Visit Newmarket

A feature of the Newmarket Fair this year was a visit by the York Pioneers and Historical Society. Members and their ladies to the number of about 140 went up by special Metropolitan cars, and were guests of the Agricultural Society for a couple of hours. Later in the afternoon they went by special invitation to Pickering College where they were royally entertained by the Trustee Board and Dr. Firth, the Principal of the College.

Nearly every visitor ascended the stairways to the top storey where in all directions they feasted their eyes on scenery, the beauty of which can scarcely be excelled on the continent. The College grounds comprise twentyfive acres, nearly all under cultivation-vegetables roots and fruit.

After a social hour renewing acquaintance a meeting was held in the large hall, presided over by Mr. Wm. Crocker, President of the Society. The speakers included Sir Wm. Mulock, Hon. E. J. Davis, Geo. Henry, M.P.P., Ex-Mayor Pearson who represented the Newmarket Fair directors; Dr. James L. Hughes, Mrs. (Dr.) Torrington, President National Council of Women; President Rogers, and Dr.

The speakers referred to the entertainment and kind hospitality of the Newmarket Agricultural Society and the Friends' Society, to the moral training of the College which stood for the best things in education, but they could not refain from referring to the tremendous sacrifices made by the motherland in coming to the assistance of little Belgium in her efforts to maintain the peace of the world, to the good work already done by Canada's brave sons, and closing with a strong plea for even greater sacrifices in providing the necessary comforts for those on active service in the horrible war.


