Dr. Ryerson's Address

The Masonic Hall was packed last evening by interested people who had come to hear Surgeon-General Ryerson speak on the War and Red Cross. After opening with "The King," Mrs. T. F. McMahon, President of the local Red Cross Auxiliary, under whose auspices the meeting was held, referred to the good work the Society is doing, the awful consequences of the war, and introduced the speaker of the evening.

Surgeon-General Ryerson said he deemed it an honor to address such an audience as he saw before him. He congratulated the women of the Red Cross on the excellent work they are doing, and gave a description of the pillage and destruction of lives and property recently witnessed by him in Belgium, France and other places. The horrible war is the result of a blind desire to gratify the ambition of the Kaiser to dominate the world; a war that deprives small countries the right to live in peace and harmony with their fellowman; a war that is carried on by unfair methods in dropping bombs on sleeping homes, killing innocent and defenceless women and children, and sinking undefended ships. The war may be a long one, but he felt certain the Germans eventually would be conquered and humbled for their cruelty and brutality.

At the conclusion of an excellent address a vote of thanks was tendered Dr. Ryerson, on motion of Mr. Dunlop, seconded by Rev. S. A. Lawrence, and Mr. Dunlop, on behalf of the Ladies of the Red Cross, presented the speaker with a beautifully arranged basket of sweet peas, for his brave daughter, Miss Laura Ryerson, who vainly endeavored to save her mother when the Lusitania was wrecked by the enemy. The Dr., who had to hurry away to address another meeting at Oak Ridges, expressed his appreciation for the beautiful flowers.

Before closing Mrs. McMahon, who presided, thanked Mr. Dunlop for securing the services of the speaker and furnishing the flowers, Mr. A. J. Hume and Mr. T. Somers for patriotic selections rendered, Mr. J. E. Newton, who presided at the piano, and Mr. Hill for motoring to the city for Dr. Ryerson.

The collection in aid of the Red Cross was \$39.30.

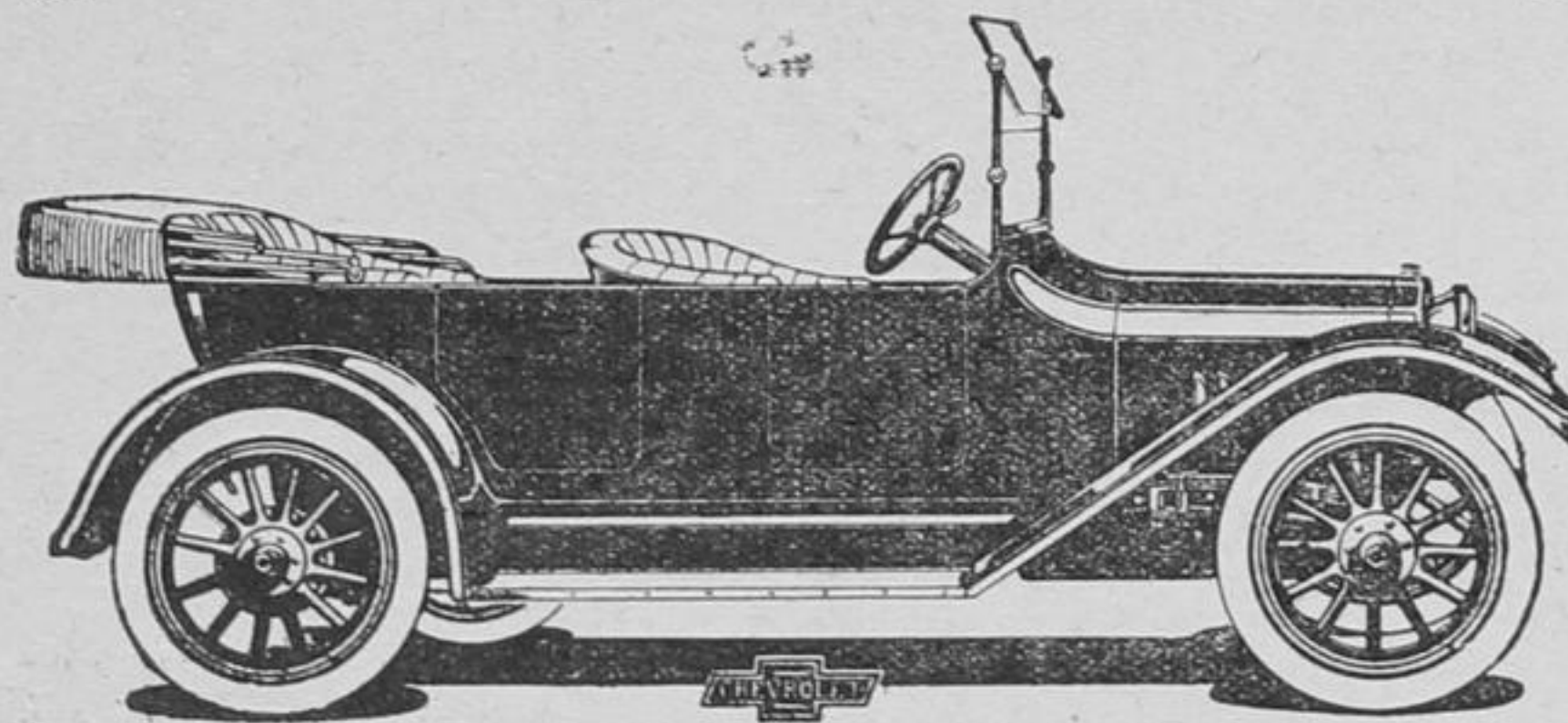
