

The electors of Peel did themselves credit last Thursday by electing Mr. Lowe over Mr. J. R. Fallis with a majority of over 300. Mr. Fallis, the ex-member, had many warm friends who sympathized with him personally, but they could not condone his act of stepping in between the Government officials who had to buy horses for war purposes, and the farmers who had horses to sell, thus making a sum for himself of \$1,800. It is true that after the investigation he handed the money over to be used for patriotic purposes, but this seemed like an admission of guilt on his part. The result of the election shows clearly that the voters in Peel county wish their representatives to be above suspicion.

Judged by a discussion in the Canadian House of Commons, following a resolution introduced by Hon. Dr., Pugsley, asking that the Dominion franchise be extended to women in such provinces as have adopted women's legislative franchise, it looks as if women will ere long be granted a vote the same as men.

The proposal was lost on a party vote, but Premier Borden promised to take into consideration at a later date the whole question of the Federal

franchise.

Many Liberal members spoke in favor of the resolution, and the strongest plea against it was put forward by Hon. Robert Rogers, who alleged that women had acted as ballot pluggers in a number of ridings at the last general election in Saskatchewan. The speaker being asked to name the ridings, Lowever, said he could not remember the names, but he could get the names if necessary.

Whether we like it or not votes for women will surely come in the near future.


