### Newton Brook Old Timers' Picnic

Newton Brook was the name given to this illustrious place when the post office came. I can remember when the mail was distributed from York Mills, before envelopes were used. It was known then as Hogg's Hollow, the letters were written on foolscap, and in the folding one page was left blank for the address. Unpaid letters were seven cents on arrival. Later Willowdale was the next nearest post office, and later Lansing and Newton Brook were placed. The name was my mother's choice, and the neighbors adopted it in honor of the spring fresher that ran impudently under the stone culvert on Yonge St. The village was a very neighborly place, and as I look back to the borrowing of bread pans, flat irons, and yeast; my mind fastens itself on my mother's brass pun that was larger than a wooden pail and visited every house in the neighborhood, at pickling and preserving time, with the instructions that always accompanied it: "Scour it with ashes before you use it, and after you use it, and return it as soon as you can for others will be coming for it." That was before cement lined kettles, granite ware or aluminum came in.

The picnic for this year is over, and the next one will be held at the Methodist Church in Newton Brook, on the second Saturday afternoon in June, 1917. Mr. Schmidt, the miller, invited us to come.

The Newton Brook old timers met met this year in the pavilion in High Park, and among the guests were the descendants of the Nichols, Agars, Munshaws, Latimers, William James, John James, Jos. James, Risebroughs, Stongs, Robinsons, Trenchs, Bales, Geo. Lees, Leavitts, Sheppards, Gordons, Mrs. Pearen, the Misses Watson, Mr. Milliken, L. J. Clark, Dr. Harold Clark, Miss McBride and Miss White. Mr. D. James was chairman and told why this gathering gave so much pleasure. Mr. L. J. Clark spoke on "Why we prize old friends." A letter was read from J. E. Middleton on "Queer things," the remembrance of a visit to Newton Brook at seven years of age. Dr. Harold Clark gave "Reminiscences of Newton Brook." He moved away from the village at 3 years of age. Stephen Agar came from Detroit to meet old friends, Mr. Geo. Nicol from Bigden (near Sarnia), and Mr. and Miss Taylor from Port Hope. They were introduced to the company as special visitors. As it was the birthday of one of the old timers, her biography was read by Miss Hopper, and her family presented her with a basket of flowers.
