

SHAME! SHAME!!

In his recent speech at Montreal Sir Wilfred Laurier urged the young men of his own race to enlist in the near future. He concluded his speech with this paragraph:

"Now I speak to you of French origin; if I were young like you, and had the same health in my youth that I enjoy to-day, I would join those brave Canadians fighting to-day for the liberation of French Territory. I would not have it said that the French-Canadians do less for the liberation of France than the citizens of British origin. I ask this, that for the honor of the French name, it may not be said that the Canadians of French origin have less courage than those of British origin."

Mr. Bourassa, the leader of the Nationalists, has since replied and in a public address declared that Mr. Laurier is a nefarious man, is guilty of national treason, is the defender in Canada of British Imperialism, and a willing slave of British tyranny.

And yet the Toronto News insists that a secret understanding exists, and that "A vote for Laurier is a vote for Bourassa."

The Benchers of the Manitoba Law Society, by unanimous vote, have placed on record their full confidence in the personal integrity of the Judges of the Province. They also resent insinuations which have been publicly made against the honor of the Judges.

Committees were appointed to canvass the village for subscriptions, and a public meeting will be held in the Masonic Hall on Wednesday evening of next week.

It is hoped that all our citizens will be ready to again assist in this worthy cause.
