Letter from Pte. John Ellis

The following is taken from a letter. dated November, "Somewhere in France," to his son in Richmond Hill: Dear Billie, -I got your letter the last day we were in England and have not got around to answer you till now, but hope you will excuse delay for this

I have not got the box yet but will likely get it soon as the mail has commenced to come here now. I have not got any mail yet but am looking for some any time, as it is 10 or 12 days since I left England and I used to average 4 or 5 a week besides papers.

Well Billie this is "Somewhere" in France alright, but it is not the way I supposed it would be for we are as comfortable here as we were in England and I feel more contented. The weather is warm and we are under canvas. Not much work so far and

The place where we are here is sup posed to be used as a base and we will go out from here to do construction work. I am down for railroad work as you know that is in my line. I cannot tell you how far we are away from the firing line, but we must be a long way for I cannot hear any sound of the guns, but some say they can.

We are issued with tobacco and matches and cigarettes here, so do not send any more after you get this letter as I have all I need.

The people here work on Sunday as well as week days. I see them hauling in roots to-day. I will write to Hilda next, but do not look for too many letters for we

have not the same chance to write here that we had in England, but will try and answer all I get. I hope you keep working and do as

well as you have been doing till I get back to Canada, which I hope will be before many months.

Inter=County Stock Judging Contest

Winter Fair - Guelph

In 1915 the Winter Fair, Guelph, instituted what is known as the Inter-County Stock Judging Contest. This contest is among teams composed of three young men from each county, RESIDENCE chosen and trained by the District Representative of the Department of Agriculture. Before a young man is eligible he must be under 25 years of age and must have attended one of Mr. Frank Converse Smith the Annual Winter Courses in Agriculture given by the District Representative.

The contest comprises the judging of two classes of Heavy Horses, two classes on Dairy Cattle, two of Beef Cattle, two of Sheep and two of Swine. Individual cash prizes are given in each class of stock, and for the team winning the highest number of points a very handsome Silver Cup, donated by the late Minister of Agriculture for Ontario, Hon. Jas. Duff, and Silver Medals for each member of the winning team.

The team sent from York County this year was composed of Harry Hill, Aurora; James Hope, Pine Orchard, and Charlie Boynton, Dollar. These men all did excellent work and not only succeeded in winning the Duff will resume his classes at Richmond Trophy and Medals, but won a large share of the individual cash prizes besides, thus winning a great deal of honor for themselves as well as the County of York and Mr. J. C. Steckley, Newmarket, who selected and coached the team. There were twenty-one counties entered in the contest. The following is the standing of the four counties standing highest in the con-
