Two rinks from Thornhill came up Friday afternoon and played a match with the home rinks. The score at the close was 29 to 19, in favor of Richmond Hill. H. Hooper and W. Riddell skipped the rinks for the visitors, and J. Tyndall and A. E. Glass for the home rinks.

UNIONVILLE

The hall at Unionville was the scene of two hotly contested debates, Friday, Feb. 2, at 2.30 p.m. when the Junior Farmers Improvement Association held their first Inter-Association contests. The Unionville organization was out en masse to greet the visitors from North York, Woodbridge and Richmond Hill. Owing to the combination of zero weather and a high northwest wind, many of the members of the visiting branches failed to put in an appearance.

The first debate was Resolved that a system of good roads is more beneficial than electric railroads; Messrs. Jas. Hope and Harry Hill of North York upholding the side of good roads vs. Messrs. Robt. Watson and Jos. Snider of Woodbridge on the negative. The contest was won by a slight margin by the boys from Woodbridge. By some misunderstanding, each team prepared the side intended for the other until three or four days before the contest took place.

The other debate was Resolved that country life is preferable to city life. As the boys taking part were all enthusiastic agriculturists, those on the negative side were at a disadvantage, and are to be congratulated for the able way in which they handled the subject. Messrs. Clark Yonge and R. J. Ash of the Unionville class of 1917, out-pointed Messrs. E. Rumble and Bert Kane of Richmond Hill, 1916; Mr. J. C. Steckley and Mr. Wiggins giving the decision.

Mr. Steckley, district representative of York, is greatly to be complimented for the amount of tedious work he has done in order to get together and organize so many zealous young farmers. He may rest assured that any move he now makes to promote better farming will be strongly endorsed by the ten score organized young farmers in York County.
