Dr. L. G. Langstaff's Death

Many friends heard with regret that Dr. L. G. Langstaff had passed away at his residence, Thornhill, on Saturday after a comparatively short illness. He had been particularly strong and robust all his life till about three months ago when a growth seemed to develop in his head. He went to New York to consult a specialist, but received little encouragement. He went to Brooklyn, N. Y., over 20 years ago and formed a partnership with his brother, Elliott, but returned to his Thornhill Springs residence a few years ago. He was a lovable disposition, and was never happier than when meeting old friends and acquaintances. The funeral took place on Tuesday from Trinity Church, the remains lying in the church from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. The solemn service was taken by the rector, Rev. S. A. Lawrence, assisted by Rev. R. Haughton. Deceased is survived by a widow and a baby daughter less than a year old.

We Must Still Recruit

We ought not to deceive ourselves by the idea that the war is already won. While there are many hopeful signs, there is still a vast amount of heavy work to do before the needful end is reached. The following serious words are from a recent communication from England:—"Some of our commanders incline towards the belief that Germany's coming repulse, however quickly followed up, may still necessitate a further Autumn and Spring Campaign in 1918 for the final blows. There must in their opinion be no weakening of recruiting enthusiasm in Canada. Many men will be wanted, they say. They must train now or they will never be of any use. General Lipsett, speaking when distributing prizes at a divisional boxing competition warned the soldiers that while Germany approaches the final round of the fight showing signs of exhaustion, boxers seemingly exhausted often have a big punch in reserve. Don't cease preparations, rather redouble them, is the army's message." When the end is within reach it means usually, that even greater efforts than before must be put forth in order to finish the task at once. There is still much to do before Canada raises the 500,000 promised by Sir Robert Borden, and each county must do its share.

The pastor referred in feeling terms to those who had been wounded, and to the three young men—C. Caldwell, C. Metcalf, and E. Hughes who had made the supreme sacrifice. During the evening the Honor Roll, draped with flags, was unveiled as the congregation rose to their feet and sang "God Save Our Splendid Men". Appropriate solos were sung by Mrs. Reno of Toronto, Miss W. Aikenhead and Miss E. Switzer.

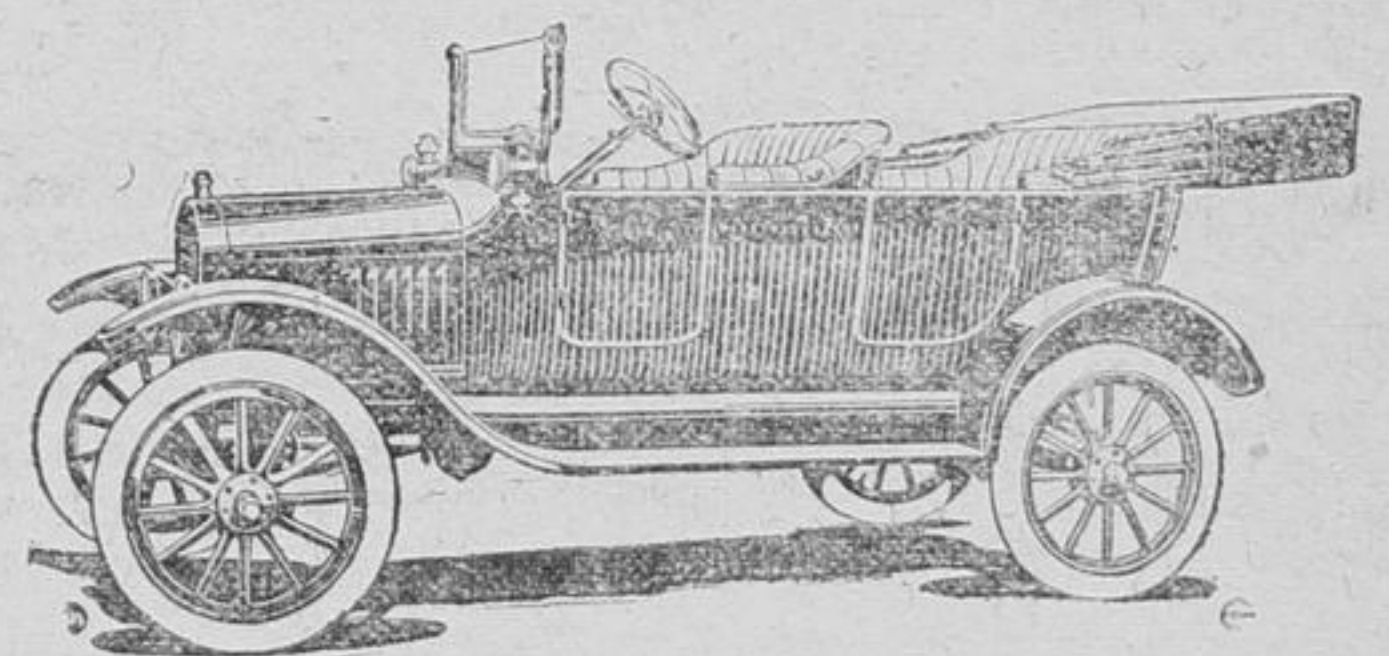
