Also a further fine if these are attached to trees, or trees on the highway anyway injured, see R.S.O., Ch. 213, S. 6.

Nor may such obstructions as gasoline tanks, scales, waiting rooms, sheds, etc., be maintained on such highways without a permit from said Board.

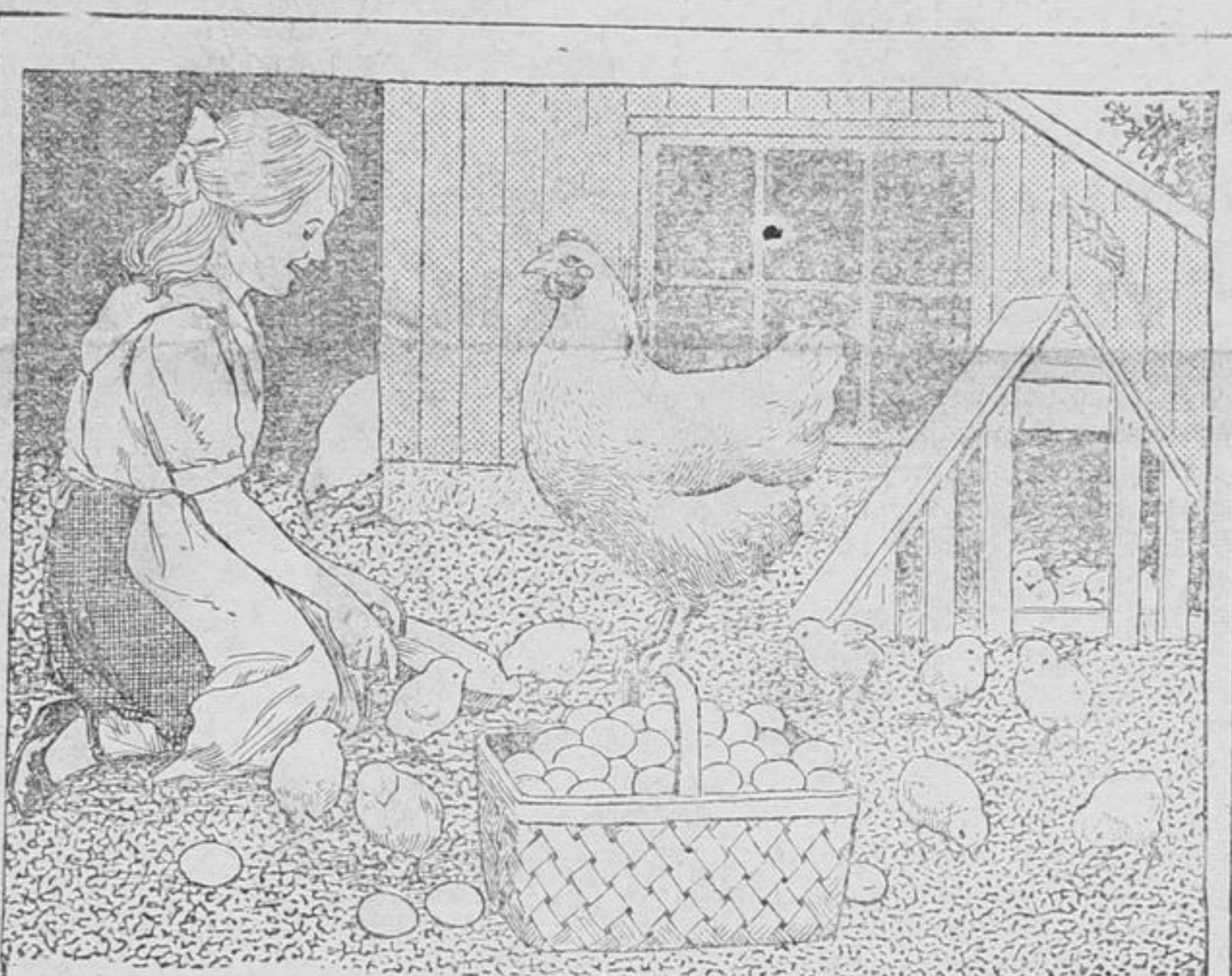
