**Dr. Zielinski Dead**

Dr. Zielinski was a well known figure in Edgley, Vaughan, fifty years ago. He in company with his brother, tired of the iron rule of the Kaiser, "folded their tents as the Arabs, and silently stole away." He came from what was then known as Prussian Poland, and bore no loving affection for the ruling power. He lost no time in becoming a British subject and was a truly loyal citizen, proud of his adopted country and the liberties he enjoyed.

After his father's death the Dr. tried to secure some portion of the large estate left to the family, but without avail. He then went to Berlin and secured a personal interview with the Kaiser, the grandfather of the present ruler. He treated the Dr. very kindly, listened to his statements, yet absolutely refused to allow a dollar to go to Canada. In a cordial manner he invited him to come and settle on his estate and resume his former allegiance. The Dr. saw through the trap and addressing the Kaiser said "No, your Majesty, never. I am a subject of Queen Victoria and you dare not harm me, but the day I resume my allegiance to you, instead of gaining my estate off goes my head." The Kaiser smiled a grim sardonic smile and the interview closed.

Dr. Zielinski was a well qualified physician of the "Eclectic" school and met much persecution at one time at the hands of his "Allopathic" medical brethren. Through the efforts of the late Clarke Wallace, M.P., he secured official recognition and enjoyed a large practice. About 47 years ago he married Mrs. Susannah Schmidt, a sister of John Snider of Edgley; she died many years ago. Though originally a Roman Catholic, in this country he attended the Lutheran Church.

**Elia Horse-Breeders' Club**

The horse-breeders in the vicinity of Elia held their organization meeting in Elia Forester's Hall, Wednesday, March 21, at 8 p.m. A good representation of the district was present. The meeting opened by Jno. Jackson being elected chairman and Geo. Jackson, secretary pro-tem.

Although a motion at Elia Farmers' Club meeting that a horse-breeders' club be formed, it was deemed well to have it brought before the meeting as a large area of land was represented. After considerable discussion it was carried unanimously that an organization known as "Elia Horse-Breeders' Club" be formed and the breed of horses taken up be Clydesdales. The election of officers was then held with the following results:

Many of the rules of the federal scheme were thrashed out, such as, "The Club shall guarantee a certain number of mares, all fees shall be collected by the Club and one-third of the fees for each guaranteed mare shall be paid to the Club at the end of the season." The membership fee was not settled definitely. It was held by several that one-third of the service fees minus 40% of that third plus the membership fee was quite a risk in case a mare did not prove to be in foal. However it was agreed by all that 40% was quite a rebate and it is in that unity that success depends.

In order to have the matter settled in a satisfactory manner, a mass meeting is being convened Friday, March 30, at 8 p.m. in Elia Hall. All farmers interested will be welcomed, and especially delegates from existing farmers' organizations. The directors have been elected from several sides of the district, and if any other neighborhood wants a look-in on the ground floor, opportunity will be given them at that meeting. It is expected when the Club is in operation the area covered will include all or some parts of each of the following—Downsview, Emery, Thistleton, Woodbridge, Edgley, Maple, Concord, Thornhill and Elia. 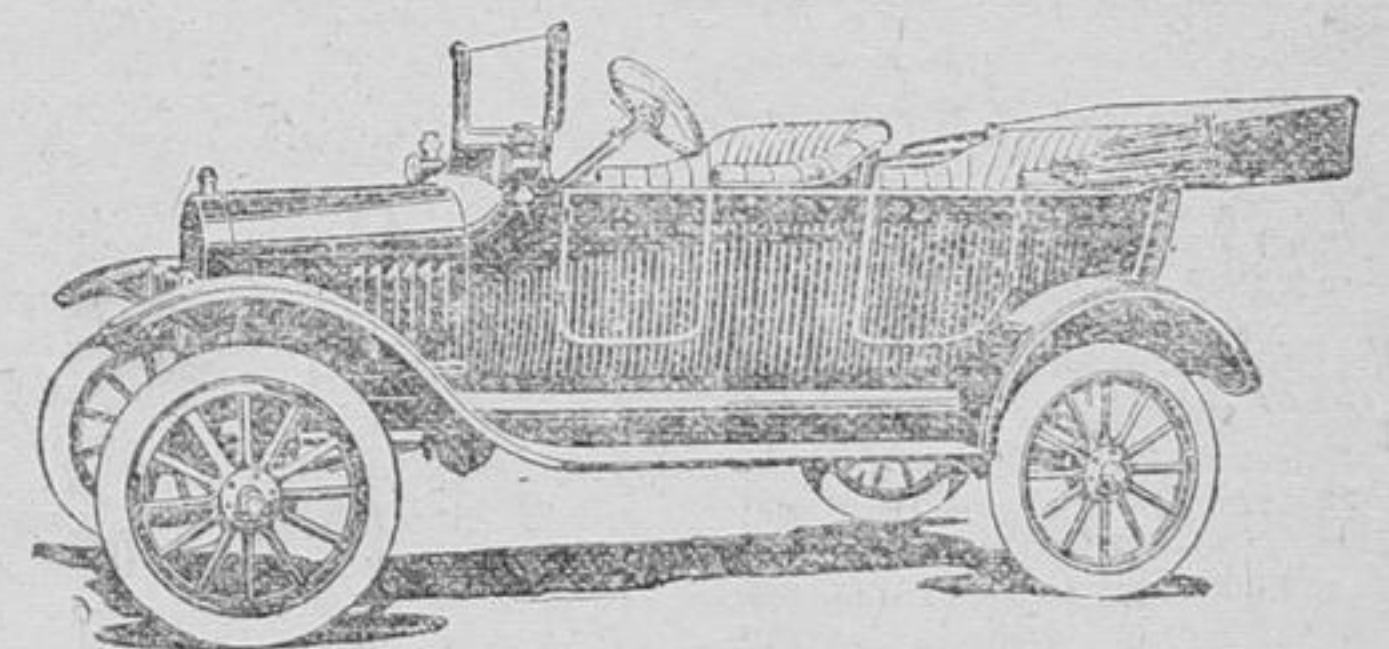
