"The plow is our hope," declared  
Right Hon. David Lloyd George, the  
Prime Minister of Great Britain. The  
tremendous significance of these words in  
the face of a world shortage of food must  
be a matter of concern to all. It points  
out the path of duty to men and boys  
unable to enlist in the army but capable of  
helping to increase production.

## Help the farmer increase production

At this supreme hour when ample food production is  
one of the indispensable means of victory, the country  
faces a serious shortage of men and boys on the farms. The  
Department of Agriculture emphasizes the urgency of every  
man and boy taking to heart this splendid opportunity for  
patriotic service.

**Boys** Decide now to help in the war. If you are between the  
ages of 14 and 18, and have good term record, you can  
secure promotion at school by enlisting for farm service  
any time between April 20th and May 20th.

Parents are urged to encourage their boys to enlist for farm  
service. The physical and moral welfare of your boy will be  
advanced by a summer spent close to Nature; an interest will be  
awakened in an important industry of the country that will be a  
help to him in his whole future.

**Men** The Department appeals to retired farmers, to men  
following no occupation (retired), to business men who  
can spare at least a portion of their time, to all men who  
can arrange their affairs so as to help some farmer. Every man is  
invited to enlist for farm service.

### UNIONVILLE

At a meeting of the Executive Com-  
mittee of the Markham Township  
Sunday School Association, held in  
Unionville immediately after the An-  
nual Convention of the Association  
held at Victoria Square on Jan. 18 and  
19, it was unanimously decided to fol-  
low up the work of the convention by  
some definite plan, applicable to the  
whole township, to stimulate Sunday  
School work and the study of God's  
word in the home.

It was resolved that the hearty co-  
operation of all the Ministers, Sunday  
School Superintendents and workers  
with the members of the Executive  
Committee should be obtained, conse-  
quently it was decided to call a meet-  
ing of all such on March 10th in the  
Methodist Church, Unionville. That  
meeting was well attended, nineteen  
schools being represented. The dele-  
gates were very enthusiastic over the  
movement and it was decided to start  
a campaign under the Home Depart-  
ment and Adult Bible Class Depart-  
ment to enlist every person who  
should and who could be a member of  
the Sunday School, and for those who  
positively could not attend have a  
Home Department organized in every  
school and enlist such persons in that  
department of Sunday School work.

Committees were appointed to visit  
the different schools and have the  
plan of campaign explained, and also  
ask that a committee be appointed in  
each school to organize for an every  
member canvass to be held simultane-  
ously throughout the Township on  
the afternoon of May 20th to enlist  
every person who is not now a mem-  
ber of any Sunday School or not ac-  
tively engaged in Sunday School work.  
Since the above organization was  
effected the South York Sunday  
School Association has taken up work  
along similar lines, and at a meeting  
held in Toronto, March 30th, it was  
decided to organize the whole of South  
York for the purpose of carrying out  
the campaign.

Someone has said "The great need  
of the world to-day is an open bible,"  
and we believe that Markham Town-  
ship needs it, and hope and pray that  
every Sunday School will help our  
effort to further the cause of our Lord  
and Saviour Jesus Christ.
