Six Escaped Three Captured

There were six escapes from the jail farm on the 13th of May. Three have since been captured. W. Moore was sent to the reception hospital for examination. Roy Volkler, arrested at Hamilton on the 25th of May, was committed for trial by Magistrate Brunton. Harold Baker, after his escape, hired with a Mr. Playter at Pine Orchard, and in a few days decamped with \$155 and a suit of clothes, the property of another hired hand. He also was arrested in Hamilton, with only \$2 on his person, and brought back to Toronto by County Constable George Thompson. Before Mr. Brunton he pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to two years imprisonment on each charge, to run concurrently.

Mrs. Robert Tricker, formerly Miss Matilda Jordan, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. G. A. Miles, 221 East Amelia St., Fort William, on the 22nd of May. The remains, brought by the husband and daughter, Mrs. A. W. The family at one time lived in Richmond Hill in the house now owned and occupied by Mr. Pratt.

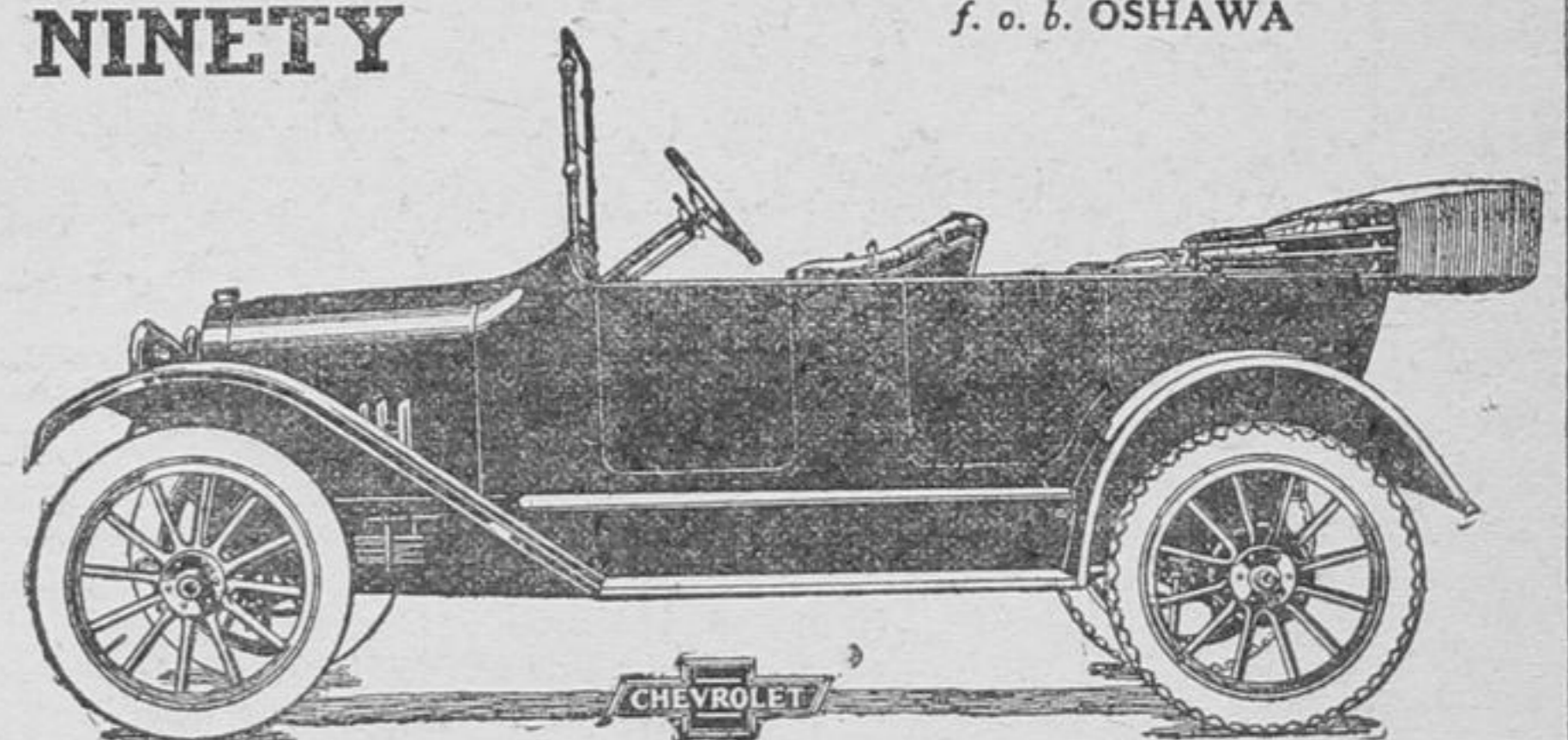
