**Resolution Passed**

The following resolution was passed by the Speakers' Patriotic League at its annual meeting on the 25th, of June. The resolution was proposed by Mr. W. E. Randle, a well known Toronto liberal and seconded by Mr. J. G. O'Donoghue, a well known representative of labor, and was heartily endorsed in the speeches of Hon. W. D. Macpherson and J. A. Paterson K.C. Resolved—That this League reaffirms its belief as expressed in the Resolution passed at its first Annual Meeting that the people will stand behind the Government in any plan which may be evolved, whether under the Militia Act or under the Defence of the Realm Act or otherwise as may seem most advantageous for the more complete and effectual mobilization of the entire resources of our country, in men and materials, for the successful prosecution of the War, and as a step essential to the carrying into effect of this policy approves of providing compulsorily and immediately the necessary reinforcements for the Canadian forces.

**Bradford Toll Road**

The purchase by York County of the toll road at Holland Landing, which was decided on by the Council at its Summer session last week, has been completed, the price paid being \$5,250, or \$250 less than the amount named for the 15-day option secured by the Council. The three and three-quarter miles of road has been well maintained under the toll system, and having become important owing to its being in the line of travel from Toronto to Camp Borden, its purchase by the Council at the price named is a matter for congratulation. The road in all takes up 30 acres of land, and with this the equipment for its upkeep becomes the property of the County. Possessions of the road will be obtained in November.
