A few weeks ago, following the general election in Alberta, when the Liberals were returned to power by a large majority, one of Toronto's dailies gave as the principal reason for the result, "the consolidation of the alien enemy vote behind the Sifton Government."

Last week the Liberals were again successful in the Province of Saskat-chewan, and the Orange Sentinel at once came forward with an explanation, "the foreign vote was unanimous for Premier Martin."


