

To Aid Prisoners

A meeting was held at the residence of Major Morrison, Governor of the Industrial Farm, Langstaff, Thursday evening, presided over by Canon Greene. The Governor explained that frequently prisoners were sent to the Farm in warm weather, without underclothing, and wearing straw hats, and are allowed to leave in cold weather in the same light clothing. The object is to procure underwear, etc., to cover such cases, and to assist in getting suitable employment for the prisoners who leave the Farm. Short addresses were given by Mrs. Fraser, Father Bench, Sergeant Wief, Father Kelley, Mr. Arnold, Mr. Moyle, Rev. Lawrence, Dr. L. Langstaff, Miss O'Connor and others. A committee was appointed to act in conjunction with Major Morrison.

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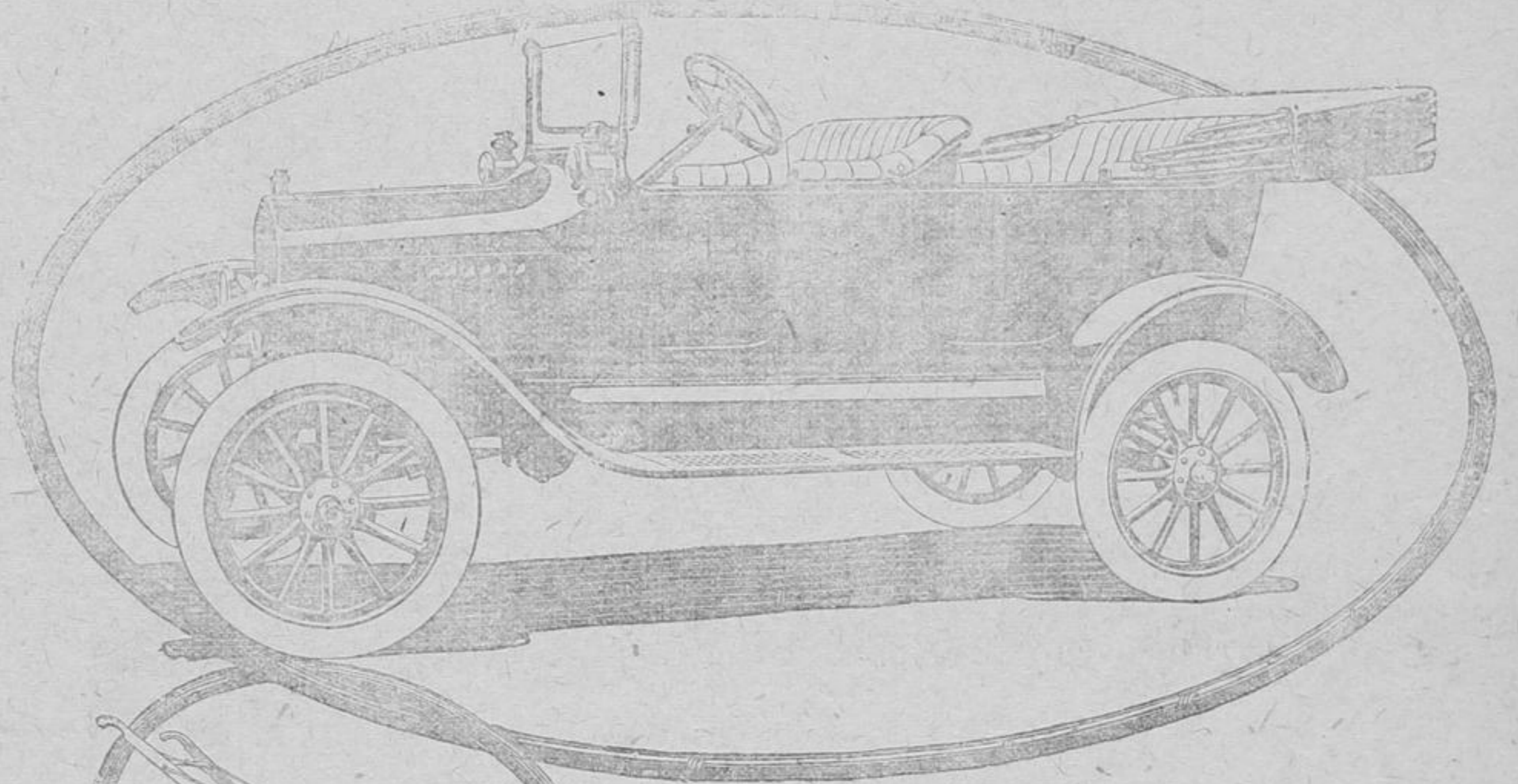
